THE WORD MOST DEFEND.

HUNGARY'S PREMIER HINTS THAT STRONG MAY BE FIGHTING.

Deputies to the National Assembly to Oppose Russia-Russian Agents Inciting Struggle to Violence - A State of Siege at Budapest.

VIENNA, Nov. 4.—In the Austrian and Hungarian delegations to the Prime Minister Von Tisza and Herr Smolke declared that they were ready to defend with the sword.

In the Hungarian delegation, Prime Minister Tisza said the members had a duty to perform. He said he would endeavor to obtain a clear idea of the country's foreign relations, whether the policy of the Government was a policy betting the monarchy, and whether it was a policy betting the republic.

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PLANNED WITH THE RESULT. Henry George, of the New York University, has been elected to the result of the election, and what are your future plans? Henry George was asked yesterday. Personally, I am pleased with the result. I had no personal desire to be Mayor of New York, and only took the position of candidate because I was called upon to head the struggle for reform. I undoubtedly received the vote of the majority of the honest and intelligent workers of New York. We were beaten only by money and other evil influences which were united against me. The question is now in American politics. Politicians can no longer afford to ignore it. I will do in future what I have done in the past and endeavor to create the masses on this and kindred subjects. Mr. George said he would not entertain the proposition to run for Congress.

COUNTING PARTY NOSES.

DEMS. AND REPS. FIGURING OUT HOW THEY STAND.

A Pretty Close Thing in the House of Representatives - A Woman-Elected School Superintendent - Election of a Mayor.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The secretary of the Republican National Committee makes the following computation from returns received up to 9 o'clock this evening of the political complexion of the House of Representatives of the 56th Congress. The returns as far as received indicate the election of 134 Republicans, 106 Democrats, 5 Labor and Independent, 6 doubtful and 1 vacancy—Total 355. If the Democrats get four of the doubtful they will have 138, making the House Republican.

The secretary of the Democratic Committee says the Democrats will have a working majority in the House.

As a House Election in Doubt. Chicago, Nov. 4.—The election of the police returns from the Second Congressional District revealed a heretofore unsuspected error this evening in footing up the totals. Where George, a Labor man, should have been credited with 52 votes the total was 51. This reduces the majority to 10 people for Labor (Democrats) to 11. Glasgow still claims the district for himself by 23 votes.

A Lady School Superintendent. Fairport, N.Y., Nov. 4.—Newly arrived here at the election of "Kudsky" Miss Alice J. Sanborn of this city was chosen Superintendent of Schools in Brant County. One of the 1000 votes polled in the election of the Democratic and Farmer Alliance party was for the Republican, living in the town of the Freeport schools as teacher a few weeks ago, and soon after resigning. The lady is a native of the town to which she has now been elected.

Free Traders Barred and Tariff Men. Pittsburgh, Nov. 4.—John Jarrett, president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, has returned from a tour of the West, where he had been conducting a campaign against protection and other free traders. In an interview Mr. Jarrett stated that he did not go on the mission of his own volition, but was sent by the American Iron and Steel Association, which he is secretary. The Insurance Increasing. CADIZ, Nov. 4.—The Chileans have surprised and annihilated a regiment of Duranin, who were going to Cadiz. The case of the massacre was Mukuri, seventy miles south of Guzman. The insurance started by the Chileans is increasing.

A Fall in Tin. LONDON, Nov. 4.—There has been a fall in the price of tin of 28 per cent. The quotation for tin is now 100 and 100 and 100.

Bill on Strike. CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—The best men at Swift's and Morris are still out and their chances for returning are lessening. Both concerns are shipping cattle east to be slaughtered. Swift continued operating to-day with new men, who are coming from the quarters.

Three Important Bills. LONDON, Nov. 4.—At the beginning of the coming session of Parliament the Government will be ready to submit three important bills. The first has been prepared by Mr. Loug, Secretary of the Local Government Board, and will deal with allotments. The second is in charge of Mr. Nichol, and will deal with the extension of local government. The third, which will be introduced in the House of Lords by Premier Salisbury.

German Trade with America. BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Comptroller statistics show that the year's increase in the value of German exports to America is \$17,000,000, including \$4,000,000 of sugar. Compared with 1904, the total exports for the year are valued at \$3,000,000,000, of which \$1,000,000,000 is sugar.

Gen. Buller's New Strategy. DUBLIN, Nov. 4.—There has been a marked decrease of crime in Kerry, owing partly to hand-to-hand fighting. The police are closely watching suspects instead of guarding persons liable to attack. The police have been so effective that the demolition of the police protection has been commended.

A Professor Disappears. CONCORD, N.H., Nov. 4.—Prof. W. W. of the Pharmaceutical Academy here, who was recently appointed by the Sultan, has disappeared. The police have made a thorough search, but have found no trace of him. It is known that he drew a large sum of money on the day he disappeared.
