## Burger King plans outlet at plaza here

A 92-seat restaurant — the first Burger King to be built in Mississauga — is planned for construction on the Dixie Plaza property.

Ward 7 Councillor Terry Butt and Mayor Ron Searle have met with Burger King officials to discuss details of a proposed site plan for the outlet. Because the property is zoned for district commercial use, Burger King only needs approval of its site plan before a building permit is issued.

The restaurant would be located along Dixie Road, just east of the former Sayvette store, which is being transformed into a Knob Hill Farms outlet. The site plan shows a road onto Dixie, but Butt has asked Burger King to redesign its proposal to allow access only from the internal plaza road network.

Butt praised the co-operation from Burger King, an American fast-food chain, which has recently announced its

plans to challenge McDonald's for the burger market in Canada.

The store is also scheduled to be a centre for training new Burger King employees. It will provide jobs for 130 students.

The ward councillor's major concern about the proposal is the traffic congestion which may result. But the owner of the Dixie Plaza is proceeding with a study by consultants DeLeuw Cather Canada Ltd. to consider traffic improvements to facilitate access onto Dixie Road and the South Service Road of the QEW. The city and regional engineering departments are also involved in the study.

Butt is extremely pleased about the revitalization of Dixie Plaza, which languished for years after receiving strong competition from Sherway Plaza. "This is the best thing that could happen with new businesses like Knob Hill Farms and Burger King coming in," says Butt.

## 427 group to meet Davis

The Committee to Realign Highway 427 will meet with Premier William Davis, Mississauga North MPP Terry Jones and Transport Minister Jim Snow to demand the highway be moved a minimum of 200 feet to the east.

After a meeting Thursday night at the Malton Community Centre involving city planning and legal staff, as well as municipal engineering consultants, it was decided to ask for a meeting with the Premier.

Roland Graham, spokesman for the committee, says the provincial politicians will be told that the Malton community will accept a shift of not less than 200 feet.

The proposed extension now is scheduled to come within 85 feet of the nearest homes. "We feel that highway should never

have been planned that close to homes in Malton to begin with," says Graham.

engineers have been studying, with the committee, possible alternatives to the present alignment. They are developing cost estimates for the changes they propose.

Jones has indicated that he will support a shift, if it is not too expensive for taxpayers.

Ministry of transportation and communications staffers are anxious to proceed with the second phase of construction of the extension, which was designed in 1966.

Following its meeting with Premier Davis, the 427 committee plans to call a public meeting in Malton to discuss a course of action.
