The actual amount of payments agreed
 to be made for lands ceded to the Crown by
 the Indians in upper Canada, cannot
 exceed \$4155 per ann. but may be
 less according to their numbers as each
 individual was to receive £2.10 per
 therefore should their numbers decrease
 the payment of course become less but
 would exceed the original sum, I
 was instructed by Major Bowler, then
 Military Secretary, that such should be
 the terms. no cash payments

What is the half headed
 amount of payment for
 lands made in goods and
 cash, in upper Canada
 annually, to the Indian
 tribes, for which Govt.
 is understood to be paid
 by contracts with these
 Nations

The annual amount of presents paid
 to Indians in upper Canada, by the
 Montreal Proc. fund is Nineteen
 thousand eight hundred & fifty one
 pounds 2/0. Province Currency.

What is the amount
 of goods spent annually
 in the Province to the
 Indian Tribes as presents

From their fidelity to the Crown since
 England had any intercourse with them
 particularly since the capture of Niagara
 in the year 1759. and in 1764 when the
 Western Confederacy were more strongly
 united to the Interest of the Crown.
