Indian Reserves set aside as Fishing Reserves in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

- Province of Manitoba.

 No.61 A, Situated at Clear Lake, Manitoba in Township 20, R.19

 W of I.M. reserved and set apart as a fishing station for the Indians of Keeseekooweneus Band by O.C. 8th July, 1896.

 An addition of 320 acres was purchased last season, being the East 1/2 of Sec.8 F.88004.
- No 62A, Surrendered, consists of Sec 24, Tp 20 R.24 W of I.M., set apart as a Fishing station for the Indians of Way-Way-Sec-cappo Band by O.C. 19th October, 1894. The Indians were to surrender a portion of their original Reserve in payment for this. They afterwards declined to do so. A surrender was then taken before it could be disposed of. This action seems to confirm the view that the title to this Reserve was in the Indians. F. II4513
- No.65 B, This was applied for in the first place as a Fishing reserve for the band of the Key Pelly Agency.

An O.C.dated 25th July,1895 orders that Indians reserve
65 B at Steep Rock Point, Dawson Bay according to a plan of
survey made by D.L.S., Nelson for the Land of "The Key" is
withdrawn from the operation of the Dominion Lands Act
subject to existing rights as defined or created thereunder
Province of Saskatchewan

No. 72 A, In Tp 19,R.5 W of 2nd M. Confirmed by General O.C. dated,

17 May,1889, confirming all reserves shown in book of Indian

Reserves.

Description in book does not describe this as being set apart aside as afishing reserve, but title of plan in book is "Fishing Grounds for band of Chief Kakenwistawaw.

No 80 A, In Tp.21, R.22 W of 2nd M. at Long Lake North of Regina.

Confirmed by General O.C. dated 17th May, 1889 confirming

all reserves shown in book of Indian Reserves.
