CRIMINAL CASE AT COUNTY COURT.
A colored man named Edwards was tried before Judge Bell, charged with giving a cheque for one dollar on the Standard Bank and obtaining from the Braddon a colored barber, of Chatham, one dollar, while as a matter of fact Edwards did not have any money and never had any money deposited in said bank.
