

# DR. GORDON ON SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Bridge Street Church Auditorium. Filled With Men of All Ages

(From Tuesday's Daily.)  
Bridge St. Methodist church was packed with men and boys on Sunday afternoon when Dr. Gordon delivered an address and an appeal for the Christian life. His words were sincere yet sympathetic.

Speaking of the British and American ideals, they do not stand for money, he said, but for justice and a manhood foursquare to the winds. A wealthy man once said that he gave his employees good advice if they erred and if a second lapse took place, they might go to the dogs so far as he was concerned. In this heartless way spoke a man, surrounded by wealth of men like himself subject to temptation.

We have the history of Babylon, Nineveh, Greece, Rome to show how great empires declined and we have others illustrating the reasons for progress. There are five periods of development in the life of nations—adversity, prosperity, luxury, dissipation, and disintegration. Rome stood in her hour of adversity. Rome could not stand when the homelife became corrupt and divorce prevalent. The necessity of a strong mind in a strong body was urged. A physical basis for our civilization is necessary.

When that is gone, the nation is gone. There is a physical degeneration of wealth. The mind is the measure of the man and there must be a mental basis for power. The man who can't think is a idiot, the man who won't think is a fool, and a man who doesn't think is a slave. What is the best personal illustration of the power of a pure life? The Jew. The Jew has done more for humanity than any other man. He lives eleven years longer than the average Gentile and Christian. The Jew has prospered in spite of Christian persecution and prosecution. Power means the glow of genius, spirit, vitality. When passion begins to speak, conscience begins also to speak. Man's conscience is the oracle of God.

Dr. Gordon referred to the quality of conversation. Should not a young man see the world, some ask. There are two worlds, said the speaker, and one of them is not worth seeing. Besides, will power to conquer temptation, Jesus Christ is needed. During the service, Mr. Greenlaw sang in magnificent form several numbers, among them being, "His Majesty the King," and "Will There Be Any Stars?"

# WHEN THE WAR WILL BE ENDED

Rev. Dr. Gordon Discussed Qualities of the Ideal General, Illustrating From Lives and Sayings of Great Leaders in History

The present war—how and when will it end? asked Dr. J. L. Gordon, at a mass meeting at Bridge Street church last night. The war will be ended, predicted the speaker, by Christmas of the present year and victory will perch upon the armies of the allies. Next spring Lord Kitchener will enter the field with one million of the finest men in the world when Germany is weakest. The British Empire shall rule the Anglo-

Saxon race. The flag that has stood for more than one thousand years shall continue to float for liberty. "Thank God for dear old England," she has yet the inheritance of a thousand years to lead.

In opening his address, Dr. Gordon said he hated war with hatred. Sherman said the truth when he declared "war is hell." We are fighting the last great war, said Dr. Gordon quoting the lines from Tennyson in regard to that ideal day: "When the war drums beat no longer

And the battle-flags are furled  
In the parliament of man,  
The federation of the world."

This is coming, and the British Empire will lead the way to that conquest and victory of peace. By and by there shall be a United States of the world. In them the British Empire shall lead.

Dr. Gordon analysed the qualities of the great generals of the world. The great leader possesses a grand plan, Wellington even at the festival at Brussels was expecting Napoleon and had previously chosen his ground. The man and youth who win and succeed have a program in life. Our Master has the greatest plan in the world.

Great generals are helpless without strong men. Men make a weighed as well as a contented. Napoleon said "How rare men are!" Kitchener declared "It makes a difference who is behind the bayonet." He was raised in the minds of the people of Britain when he urged his men to be sober and pure.

A great general knows the value of time. Napoleon crossed over the Alps in three days. He in earnest and seized the goal. By and by his has gone. There has never been a time in the history of the British Empire, when the man when wanted did not appear.

Confidence must be founded on experience. Lord Roberts saved South Africa. Life is a game of skill not a game of chance. It is experience. There never will be a time when experience will not count.

A great general understands the enemy. It is never safe to underestimate. Caesar knew the composition of the forces of the King of Judah. We need the Bible and Christ. The art of surprise is necessary in a general. Grant was advised by all his lieutenants to surrender at one time. The enemy thought he was about to capitulate, but in the early dawn he cut his way through.

A great general inspires his men with noble sentiments. Napoleon said "Remember men, forty centuries are looking down on you." The angel throng and Christ look down from above on the fight that man is putting up against sin.

Decision of character is a prominent feature in a general. We should stand in no man's way nor permit any one to keep us from Heaven. Caesar crossed the Rubicon and said "The die is cast." The angel throng said "Over the line into the Kingdom of God."

A great general should command the confidence and affection of his men. David, the Shepherd King, set the Jewish imagination on fire. How asked "is Wellington here?" Wellington said the appearance of Napoleon was equal to the reinforcement of 40,000 troops. His inspiration caused the old guard to hurl themselves to death for France. An old Scotchman said "O for an hour of Dundee."

A great general should be sure of his cause. Bismarck was not sure of his. Richard II. was for he said "die King of England." Wolfe on the Plains of Abraham cried "Then I die happy."

The Douglas in one of his wars threw the jeweled case which contained the dead heart of the dead leader Bruce, into the thickest of the fray and cried "Heart of Bruce, I follow thee or die," and his men won. But we have not a dead leader. Ours is a living Christ. "I am He that was dead and behold I am alive again for ever more."

During the evening, Mr. Greenlaw sang in excellent style "The Holy City," "I love Him" (to the tune of the old southern melody "Old Black Joe") and "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling."

Tonight Dr. Gordon speaks on "The greatest mistake in the life of a young woman."

As we have intimated in preceding articles, lax principles in home training often result in stealing, vagrancy, truancy—offences which are becoming a general menace to the public. The sympathetic philanthropist has to steel himself against sentimentality in order to outwit the youthful yet professional beggar.

Even the proprietor of the "Movies" wishes that the homes were more attractive, so that the patrons would not be continually harassed with the old, old story of "May I go in with you?"

One night not long ago, a newsboy of not more than eight years entered a church in this city about ten p.m.

After the meeting had adjourned, he eagerly sought purchasers for his papers. The minister, seeing the serious side of the situation bought all his papers and told him to go home. You might not be surprised however, to know that the same minor found this same youth, a few moments after begging more papers from his fellow newsboys.

Thus we see the necessity of interference on the part of the State. When home fails it is the duty of the State to endeavor to inculcate right principles in the minds of the youth.

This means that the policeman and truant officer must ever be on the alert for careless and idle youths.

But there is a stronger force in the development of the youth's character than the force emphasizing mere law and order. The schoolteacher, who plays such an important part in the moulding of the youth's mind, can do much to encourage stability of character and arouse enthusiasm for right principles.

Then too, the State has realized the importance of clean play as well as honest work for those whose homes are unattractive. The playgrounds, when intelligently supervised, have proved to be one of the greatest agencies in the education of the youth in honest, clean, and upright principles of play.

Public schools are beginning to appeal to every side of the youth, and are now realizing the opportunities afforded by supervision of a part of the play hours.

The church too is emphasizing the need of a greater interest in the youth Social Service, then, in its broadest significance stands for all that is honorable, upright, and practical in the training of our "citizens of tomorrow."

# ONE BATTALION MAY BE QUARTERED IN BELLEVILLE FOR THIRD CONTINGENT

Likely That More Troops Than Expected Will Be Stationed Here—Kingston Troops to Come to Belleville—Stores, Dormitories and Headquarters.

It is reported on excellent authority that Belleville may be the training centre for anywhere from 1,000 to 1,500 troops of the Third Canadian Contingent. This city is assured of at least 500 troops, not only two companies of infantry of 250 men, and it is quite probable that one thousand men or a battalion may be drilled here.

Kingston recruits for the Third Canadian Expeditionary Force will come to Belleville. A large number of the Fourteenth Regiment have already enlisted.

Lindsay leads the Third Division so far with recruits having 150 ready. Officers from Kingston were in Belleville on Saturday going over the available premises for use of the

troops and reports and maps have been sent in to headquarters.

It has been suggested that the Corby offices in the Sloan Building on Front street, next the city hall be used as officers' headquarters. These will make an ideal situation for the staff.

Pinnacle street school (now unused) will likely be used for the quartermaster's stores as it is adjacent to railroad track.

Marsla & Henthorn's foundry and the Bellville Canning factory are suggested for dormitories.

At Marsh & Henthorn's there is plenty of floor space for drilling.

In case a larger number of troops should be stationed here, the Octavia street school may be used for other stores.

The Christmas spirit of harmony and good will is apparent.

These gentlemen have good times when they unbend and meet together. Jokes and repartees abound. Not all possess the same attributes. Some have wit and humor bubbling to escape. A joke occasionally, is good as salt to season a discourse. It is no sin to laugh in church. We have quite enough of the dreadful and mournful to subdue and depress us and if we can get a touch of humor, and fun, even during the delivery of the sermon, our own is worse for it. The sermons of the day, differ from the sermons of a few years ago. Events of the present time are referred to. Our patriotism is aroused to ever heat by the impassioned eloquence of the pulpit. We feel very sorry to lose these men when they are obliged to leave, to give place to others. There are arguments in favor of a change every three or four years, and many arguments against it.
