# SAYS EVANTUREL MUST RESIGN OR ELSE SUBMIT TO EXPULSION

Government Declines to Accept the Explanation of the Prescott Man—Erring Member Regards Offer to Sell Service to Liquor Interests as Only an Indiscretion.

TORONTO, March 5.—"I ask the hon. member to consider whether he should not go further than an apology and consider whether he should not tender his resignation in due course as member for Prescott? If not, then it will be the duty of the House, and primarily of the Government to take some action in the matter."

In this quiet convincing manner Hon. J. J. Foy, Acting Prime Minister, yesterday responded to a long statement of explanation and apology offered to the Legislature by Gustave Evanturel in connection with the writing of the remarkable letter to the liquor interests, in which he offered to enter their service for a consideration of \$10,000. Hon. Mr. Foy did not handle the Prescott member at all roughly, but he succeeded in making it clear that the Government will be satisfied with nothing short of the expulsion of the offender from public life. Mr. Evanturel will have several days to make up his mind, since the government will hardly move until the member has given the Liberal Association of his riding a chance to deal with him.

Evanturel read his statement from typewritten sheets, rising on a question of privilege just as the budget debate was about to be resumed. The

statement was a document almost as unusual as the letter that caused all the trouble. Despite all that has been said and written about his action, Evanturel still seems quite unaware that he has done anything serious. He "honestly and frankly" admitted that he had been "indiscreet" and for that he freely apologized, but that in offering to take a retainer from the liquor interests for his influence and support in their behalf in the House he had been guilty of anything that necessitated his retirement from the House was quite beyond his understanding.

G. Howard Ferguson of Grenville, the man who started it all by reading Evanturel's letter, left the Prescott man alone yesterday, but he made up for it by an onslaught upon the Liberal leader for what he insisted was inconsistency in accepting the apparent support of Mr. Evanturel, knowing all the time that the member was directly opposed to his temperance policy. Hon. Mr. Foy followed with his statement of the government's position, and Mr. Rowell closed the incident for the time by expressing entire accord with the view expressed by the Acting Prime Minister and deprecating the attempt of the member for Grenville to gain political advantage from such a regrettable matter.

## WAITING ATTITUDE ONLY TEMPORARY

Belief is Held That United States Will Go After Mexico.

[By Special Wire to The Courier]  
WASHINGTON, March 5.—The apparent lull on the part of the United States in pursuing its inquiry into the death of William S. Benton, a British subject and into the mysterious disappearance of Gustave Bauch, an American citizen, is only temporary according to those well informed of the intentions of the Washington administration. The United States, it was explained to-day, simply awaits the outcome of the investigation instituted by General Carranza himself not only into the Benton execution, but in the Bauch case.

Outwardly it was apparent that General Carranza's determination to supply information about Benton case, though technically denying the United States the right to ask it was favorably received here and his prompt ordering of the inquiry into the Bauch case likewise was welcomed.

Upon the results of the investigation and General Carranza's subsequent action depend in a large measure the policy which the United States Government will pursue towards the constitutionalists. Much evidence of a conclusive character about Benton's death already have been gathered. Should the Carranza commission controvert important points satisfactorily proven here, it is unlikely that the Washington Government will remain silent on the question. There is every likelihood that if Bauch was wantonly murdered as reported a satisfactory explanation cannot be given and the punishment of the offenders will be demanded. The disposition of administration officials is to give Carranza an opportunity to carry out his announced purpose of investigation without being hindered by any other investigating committee of Americans. The latter commission however has not been dissolved and may not be until the findings of the Mexican board of inquiry are disclosed.

Persons familiar with the inaccessibility of the territory through which General Carranza will be isolated for the next ten days or more during his overland journey to Chihuahua city, do not expect that they will be any longer on the subject for another fortnight.

Though the Huerta Government has promised a full and complete explanation of the reported killing of Clemente Vergara an American citizen near Hilalgo, Mexico, nothing of a satisfactory nature has as yet been received by the state department. Governor Colquhitt's disappearance are being watched here with much interest by Washington officials.

Inventory of Street Railway  
The assessment department is busily engaged at the present time in taking an inventory of the chattels of the Grand Valley Railway Co. between Brantford and Galt, inclusive. They are also preparing a schedule of land values for the Parks board for practically all the city.

Fire Horse Sick  
"Carrie," one of the big horses on No. 1 horse wagon of the central fire department took sick last night about 10.30 p.m., and for a time it was feared that she would die. Dr. Cutcliffe was called and worked faithfully with the animal until 4 o'clock this morning. Internal inflammation was the cause, and the horse, though not out of danger now, has a chance to recover.

Y. M. C. A. Circus  
The annual circus is now a topic discussed among the physical culture classes of the Y. M. C. A. It is probable that this "very popular event" which ran three days last year, will take place during the early part of April. It will be held in the gym, and many novelty contests and stunts will be presented. Acrobatics, comedy, feats of strength and a big list of features are likely to be arranged.

Deputation from St. Marys  
A deputation from St. Marys was in the city yesterday gathering information regarding the construction of school buildings, a new public school being in contemplation in that place. The members of the deputation were: W. H. May, chairman of the public school board; Dr. Stanley and W. H. Towell. They visited and inspected the Brantford Collegiate Institute, the separate schools and secured a number of pointers for their guidance in preparing the plans and specifications for their new school building.

Leaves for Iowa  
Mr. James G. Hamner of Burford, one of the best known sheep men in Canada, leaves to-night for Iowa, where he has been appointed instructor in the State Agricultural College. Mr. Hamner has helped to make Burford as well as himself famous in sheep-raising and his departure from the Tp. to enter new fields of usefulness will be regretted. Asked to-day if he were not afraid of the U.S. alien law being put into effect to prevent his acceptance of the position, Mr. Hamner replied that he did not think there was any danger.
