No Garibaldi For Albania

Italian Ministers Disapprove of Campaign of "Red Shirts." Rome, Jan. 11.—General Ricciotti Garibaldi to-day denied a report that his son, Peppino, was organizing a Garibaldian expedition for Albania. He admitted that such a plan had once been contemplated. The scheme to have a body of 30,000 "red shirts," strengthened by the regular army invade the Balkans, through Albania last June, he said, was supported by the British and French governments subject to Italian approval, but it was opposed by Baron Sonnino, Italian minister of foreign affairs, who told him, "we cannot in any way accept or favor your proposal."

LABOR MEN MAY NOT HAVE TO RESIGN

Hope That Party Will Allow Them to Stay in Cabinet. London, Jan. 11.—There is some hope in ministerial circles that the opposition of the trades unions to Government's compulsion may so far be modified as to permit Arthur Henderson, president of the Board of Education, and William Bruce and George H. Roberts respectively to remain in the official post. The matter was considered at a Cabinet meeting yesterday when Mr. Henderson explained the attitude of himself and his two colleagues who had resigned as a result of the decision of the Labor Congress last Thursday in voting its opposition to the compulsory Bill. The Cabinet decided that Premier Asquith should invite the members of the parliamentary Labor party and the National Labor party and the Executive committee to meet him on discussion "certain aspects of the bill."

Austrians Did It

Berlin, Jan. 11.—(By wireless to Sayville)—A statement given out today by the semi-official Overseas News Agency, establishes the fact that it was an Austrian submarine which sank the Italian liner Perto Said in the Mediterranean last month, causing the death of six passengers and one member of the crew. It is asserted the steamship attempted to ram the submarine.

Thousands of Horses Exported

Law Suit in New York Brings Out Interesting Figures. New York, Jan. 11.—Just how much trans-Atlantic steamship lines are making from the shipment of horses to the allies came out in a suit brought yesterday in the federal district court by the Baker-Miller Shipping Company and Michael P. McGrath to recover alleged commissions due them. The complaint explains that in April the defendants, Thomas Harding and Son, Montreal steamship agents, with offices at 80 Broad St., and 32 Broadway, shipped 29,918 horses on Prince Line boats. At \$50 a head the Prince Line, the complainant states, collected \$1,495,900 for freight and the plaintiffs claim commissions of \$65,147,500. In August 18,800 more horses were shipped, upon which the Prince Line collected as gross freight approximately \$90,000. The plaintiffs are suing for commissions on both shipments.

HUN PROMISES DO NOT BIND HER ALLIES

Thus Her Assurances to U.S. on Sub Affairs Not Satisfactory. London, Jan. 11.—It seems to us that on present lines the Central powers have the whip-hand of the United States," says The Manchester Guardian in an editorial regarding Germany's new promises in the submarine controversy. "America's diplomatic victory, the paper goes on to say, is limited to promises as President Wilson's two principles adopted at the beginning of the controversy, namely, protection of Americans and assertion of the law of humanity—have been violated during the past six weeks in the Mediterranean with some of the worst submarine outrages. "Germany's promises," the editorial declares, "do not bind Austria nor Austria's other two allies and if, as is now suggested, the case of the Persia is allowed to drop because no one actually saw the submarine which sunk her then the Central powers have a clear guide to means whereby they may sink liners or other ships without incurring diplomatic trouble. If they sink a liner without warning and without showing themselves, how shall it be known that it was sunk by a submarine and not by a mine or earthquake?"
