The Jellyfish.

The pressure of freight and passenger traffic is so heavy that time-tables are often figured down to seconds. If the C.P.R., for instance, allowed a discrepancy of five minutes in trainmen's watches there would be horrible, disastrous muddle, collis-ions of all kinds, and a tremendous loss of life and property. Take any dozen of watch s, on any particular time-section of the C.P.R., and the probability is that there will not be a variation of more than ten sec-onds among them. If the variation exceeds ten seconds the time inspectors have not been doing their duty, and practically, such a thing as that never happens.

The engineers must have good watches. How is it done?

It is quite true that the man who constructs a time-table which takes into account six different kinds o must have a mathematician's head, but his task is greatly simplified by the perfect method the C.P R. has of keeping time to its business. It is neither taken by the forelock, nor pulled by the coat tail, but it is expected to make an ever pace day in and day out. When a clock or a watch that works for the C.P.R. gets tired, it is discharged. There is a head time-keeper at Montreal, and official time inspectors, wh travel up and down the road, seeing that everything is in proper shape, and that none of the timepieces are malingering.

The standard time is obtained this way. Every day at 11.30 a. m. in Montreal the official time is sent out from the McGill Observatory. two minutes the whole C.P.R. telegraph circuit does no business save to register the time from Montreal For the first minute the station-mas ter beats every second with the op erator in Montreal; for the second minute he beats every second second. Then, figuring the difference from Montreal, he takes note of the varia tion of the second hand on the sta tion clock. He makes a daily re cord of these variations, and if a station clock transgresses ten sec onds either way in a month it must be attended by the official clock re pairer, who is generally some reput able jeweler at one of the divisional points. If in spite of the clock doc tor the clock continues to go wrong it is retired. From these statio clocks the superintendents, section bosses, trainmasters, despatchers, engineers, conductors, brakemen, fact, all those who have to do with the moving of trains, take their time. The inquisitions of the time inspector do not end with the station clock. He has a right, and he frequently insists on it, to look at the watch of every employe of the company. After an inspection trip it is not unusual for a superintendent to get an order from headquarters like this: "Clock at Jerkwaterville to be cleaned. Brakeman Jones' watch to be retired on the 10th instant."

Teronto's First Parliament Building.

Landmark writes: In an article describing a farewell pilgrimage through the old Parliament buildings on Front street you (The To ronto Telegram) say that Mr. Yeigh tells us "the first Parliament building in Toronto was a small log building erected on Berkeley street in 1876." It is true that the first Parliament buildings in York were erected on the south side of Palace, now Front street, south of the south end of Berkeley street, but they were of brick and not of log. That they were of brick is verified by "Heriot's Travels in 1805" and by the statemen of the late Mrs. Charles Sey mour of Ottawa, who died a few days ago. She saw them burn in 1813 and informed the writer that they were of brick. It is also true that nearly every history of Toronto speaks of these buildings as being of log and wood. There can be no mistake about it that they were of brick, and red brick at that.


