How to Use Lemon Juice.

In mon juice is the most healthful acid for the system, but an authority says that it should not be taken in its natural state, as it is too strong for the stomach. A good way to prepare lemons is to take two dozen and roll each one separately on a smooth, hard surface until it is quite soft; then cut off the end and with a dull knife scrape out all the juice and pulp. Strain this carefully through a thin cloth; then make the juice almost thick with sugar, bottle in glass, using a cork stopper, and stand in a cool place.
