To the Editor of The Planet:

Dear Sir,—Allow me a short space in your valuable paper to speak on the above subject, viz., "Fire Protection."

No doubt you are aware of the excellent services we are deriving from our fire department under the able management of Chief Richard Pritchard, but I have at different times thought of the inadequate means they have were two fires to break out at about the same time. Take for instance the late Drader fire, on Queen street. Had this fire mot been got under control at the result! Why the whole block would have been wiped out, as it was the roof of Taylor's mill on William street caught fire from cinders blown in that direction, and an alarm was turned in and quickly responded to, and the blaze extinguished, Sup-

posing the fire had gotten a good start on this building, what would have been the result? Why it would have had to burn, as the firemen only had hose enough for the fire where they were at work. What they should have, and that at once, is an extra hose cart with 1,000 feet of the best hose procurable, and at each fire run both hose carts or wagons. They cannot have too






