## BLOCKS SHIP, CHANNEL

Furbiner Victorian Ashore 36 Miles Above Quebec.

yland Liner Virginian Aground In a Fog 50 Miles Below Quebec-Nineteen Feet of Water In Forward Hold of Victorian-Her Passengers, 350 In Number, Are In No Danger-The Details.

Montreal, Sept. 2.—The Allan Line royal mail steamship Victorian, one of the new turbiners, with 350 passengers, general cargo and the mails for Great Britain, ran aground at Cape Charles, 120 miles below here and about 30 miles above Quebec at noon yesterday. The liner had been steamyesterday, the liner had been steaming slowly in a thick fog, rendered thicker by dense smoke from forest fires on shore. The Allans here have been informed that there is 19 feet of water in the forward hold of the steamer, and that she is hard aground

steamer, and that she is hard aground forward, with her stern protruding at an angle into the ship channel.

All available wrecking appliances at Quebec had been despatched earlier in the day to Crane Island, fifty miles below Quebec, to the assistance of the Leyland Liner Virginian, which went aground there at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, while hound for this nort aground there at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, while bound for this port with 3,000 tons of general cargo from Antwerp. This necessitated the sending of wreckers from this port. Tugs and lighters left here at 4 o'clock yesterady and were due at the steamer's side about midnight.

The Allans have announced that the transfer of the mails will be left entirely to the postoffice department, and officials there have not yet decided upon what action to take. The

cided upon what action to take. The passengers of the stranded liner are quite comfortable and in no danger. They will be given the option of remaining over at the line's expense until the Allan Liner Bayarian sails from here next Friday, or having their passage money refunded. Strenuous efforts will be made to have the liner off as soon as possible. She will be lightered considerably and will as soon as she floats be taken to dry dock

Word has been received here that the Victorian is blocking the ship channel. The Dominion liner Ken-sington, for Liverpool, is sailing this morning, and there are a number of freight steamers to leave. The Government tug Frontenac will proceed to the scene of the grounding and wire directions to outgoing liners. Meantime all outward bound vessels will at Batiscan, above Cape
