Exhibition Notes. The various Special Committees of the Halifax Exhibition Commission have their work well under way and every thing at present promises the Exhibition will be a grand success.

The Grounds and Buildings Committee have awarded the contract for building new horse sheds and carriage building to John McInnes & Son, who have already a large gang at work on the grounds.

The Printing Committee has had over 8000 prize lists distributed and 2000 posters, and are arranging to send out other lots of posters showing special features and rates of travel.

The Special Attractions Committee are working up a fine programme which they expect to publish shortly.

The committee on appointment of judges have made selections for the majority of the classes after giving the matter close and careful consideration.

An important addition has been made to the prize list in the form of a new class for Fish, providing for Codfish, Haddock, Hake, Herring, Alewives, Mackerel, and Salmon, particulars of which may be had on application to the Secretary, W. E. Thompson, 43 Sackville Street.

Entries have already been made of various kinds of Machinery, Dresses and Mantles, Furniture, Horses, China, Pottery, Fruit, Photography, Ladies' works, School work and other classes, and daily enquiries are being received from all parts of the Province.

Parties wishing to secure a good space should make their entries at once, and if they intend making a special exhibit they should set out what they wish in a letter to the Secretary, who will have the application considered specially.

Enquiries having been received from several manufacturers whose goods are not provided for in the prize list of the Provincial Exhibition to be held in Halifax, September 25th to 28th, inclusive, 1894, we are authorized to state that if these manufacturers will enter their goods for exhibition, under "Miscellaneous Manufacturers," they will be received, and such spaces as are at the disposal of the Committee will be allotted them. They will rank with the other manufacturers specified in the prize list for prizes.

James H. Harris of the Nova Scotia Nursery, Halifax, has been appointed Chairman of the Horticultural Department.

Change of Dates of Close Season. Under an act passed 12th day of Feb., 1893, it is enacted: 1. That no person shall kill or attempt to kill moose or caribou except from the 1st of September to the 15th of January, and no person shall kill more than 2 moose or 4 caribou.

The fourth annual convention of the Baptist Young People's Union of America began its sessions in Toronto on Thursday of last week. Massey Music Hall was unable to hold the crowd that attended and overflow meetings had to be held in the Metropolitan Methodist and Jays street Baptist churches. In the report of the general secretary was included a proposal for legal incorporation of the union and the application for a charter.

Addresses were delivered at the several meetings by prominent delegates from different parts of Canada and the United States. Mayor Kennedy extended a welcome to the delegates on behalf of the city of Toronto.

Hon. Mr. Haggart, has introduced a bill to amend the act respecting the sale of railway passenger tickets. The object was to prevent fraud in the selling of the unused portion of return tickets. The bill will compel anyone holding a return ticket, and not wishing to use it, to present it at the railway station and sign a statement declaring he is the purchaser.

The legislative business of the session at Ottawa was practically concluded on Saturday, although prorogation did not take place till Monday afternoon, when his excellency prorogated parliament with all due ceremony. The session lasted four months and eight days.

Railway Accident.

ON THE WINDSOR & ANNAPOLIS LINE. NO LIVES LOST.

Up to the present time the Windsor and Annapolis Railway has had a remarkable record as to freedom from serious accidents occurring along its line. On Monday last however, a disaster occurred, which might have been attended with wholesale loss of life, although fortunately such was not the case.

At 8.30 a. m. a special excursion train consisting of engine No. 10 (the Kentville) and six first class passenger cars left Windsor station for Digby, with about fifty passengers who had taken advantage of the cheap rates to visit Digby on the annual "cherry excursion" which has always been so much enjoyed. The train was in charge of Conductor A. Herbert, the engineer being Fred Miller, of Richmond. Most of the passengers were in the rear car, the first car, fortunately being altogether vacant. The excursion train had left Mt. Denson, and was proceeding rather slowly near Pentz bridge, when the special from Kentville, known as the "iron ore train" and consisting of engine No. 4 (the Blomidon) and six passenger cars, came rushing round a curve in the road. It was too late to save either train, and the two engines came together with a terrific force, the tender of the excursion train being forced back into the empty passenger car a distance of about ten feet.

Had any passengers been in this car there would have been a horrible tale to relate, but providentially not one of the fifty excursionists was injured in any way, all the injuries being to the train employees. The iron ore train was in charge of Conductor W. Herbert. Those who were hurt were:—

Fred Miller, married, of Richmond, engineer of the excursion train, who jumped from the engine and was struck by the cap of the sand box. He is badly injured about the head and face, his nose being dislocated.

W. McNeil, Lawrencetown, fireman, was cut in the face and otherwise injured about the head and shoulders.

Albert Rathburn, Avonport, hands and legs injured.

Wm. Taylor, of Kentville, engineer whose injuries are the most serious of all. He was hurt about the scalp and shoulders and is also injured internally. His sufferings were intense for some hours, but he is now progressing favorably. He is married.

With the exception of Engineer Fred Miller, all injured belonged to the eastern bound train.

Messrs Taylor and Miller were carried by team to Windsor and taken to the Hotel Duffin, where they were attended by Dr Reid. The others were taken to neighboring houses where they secured the best of attention until the arrival of Dr Moore, who came from Kentville on the wrecking train. All are now doing well.

The collision occurred at one of the worst spots possible for such an accident—on a bridge, with steep embankments down either side. This made the work of clearing the track more difficult than under other circumstances. The express train, bound west, which arrived at Windsor on time, was delayed for two and a half hours. The engine and baggage car of the express were sent to the scene of the wreck and brought the cars and the excursionists back to Windsor. During the day passengers and their baggage were transferred to trains at each side of the wreck, but by six o'clock the line was cleared and trains are now running with their accustomed regularity. The damage to the rolling stock will be very considerable. The two engines are complete wrecks, and the passenger car—one of the best on the road—was very badly smashed. They have been taken to the car shops in Kentville, and it may be found possible to repair them.

The Canadian Club House lies the appearance on the outside of rough granite with a white finish, and is surrounded by young pines, suggestive of Canadian scenery.

Upon entering the building we find a neat parlor to the left with the very necessary mirror upon its walls before which one can straighten one's hat after being blown about by a San Francisco summer gale. The walls are decorated with paintings and photographs of Canadian scenes and of the men of whom we are so proud. The staff and strips, and our own flag are everywhere draped to gather. To the right of the broad hall, way is a very pleasant dining-room where good homelike meals are served in an attractive style. The young man in charge was from Prince Edward Island. We did not learn his name. At the end of the broad hall we noticed a curtain hanging, and we also noticed that we were not invited to step that way. We were informed afterwards that behind that curtain was the Club room. We thought, by the alcoholic odor as we passed by, and by the peculiar way in which the men passed in or out, that it must be some sort of a dissecting room or a trap of the evil one. We were not long in concluding it was a place where the drink poison was dealt out. Let me hasten to say that we were much pleased to learn that the President, H. Le Baron Smith, was a thorough prohibitionist.

On Stanford University day, at the Fair, March 23d, ex-President Harrison was entertained by the Club. At the quiet luncheon, in the presence of other distinguished guests, President Smith proposed a toast to ex-President Harrison in a glass of the pure cold water.

April 24 was Canadian day at the Fair. We give a quotation from the eloquent address given on that day by Dr. W. F. McNutt: "May the World's Fair at Chicago, and the Midwinter Fair of San Francisco be the means of securing commercial reciprocity between Canada and the United States. With commercial reciprocity will come mutual interests, friendship, and respect, and what the relationship of these two nations may be one hundred years from now, we may not predict. But we may venture the assertion that if they be one nation it will be the greatest power on the globe; if not, they will be the two foremost nations in wealth, intelligence, in their respect for law, order, freedom and liberty."

We forgot to mention that the sweet chime bells from the great tower played for us on the evening of the 24th, "Rule Britannia" and "America." Of course we sang to that last tune: "God save our gracious Queen, God save our noble Queen, God save our Queen."
