Take Over Railways.

The big railway problem in Canada is not yet settled. Conflicting reports come from Ottawa as to what the government is likely to do but both the official has been announced. The overwhelming opinion of Western Canada is undoubtedly reflected in the resolutions of the farmers' conventions demanding that all the railways be taken over by the government. Halfway measures will give no satisfaction. If the government takes over the poverty stricken roads and leaves the C. P. R. to operate as a private concern it is to do but nothing as a national disaster. The business-like thing to do would be to take all the roads and put them under the management of the most capable of officials of the C. P. R. They have proved that they know how to operate a railway. To put them under the railway commission would be a blunder. If the government takes over all the roads the railway commission might well be abolished as it does not possess the confidence of the public and has not the ability to operate a railway system. Now is the time to make a definite kind of Railway influence in national politics and to give us a time efficiency in transportation facilities. Western public opinion should be active. Every local association should discuss this question and send to Sir Robert Borden promptly the decision it arrives at.—Graham Groves Guide.

It is now proposed to stipulate that a dozen of them must weigh a pound and a half, and for any deficiency in such weight the dealers would have to throw in a few extra.
