NEWMAN CLARK IS NOT SANE

Therefore Plea That Prisoner Not Fi

Andover, Sept. 29 The case of Newman Clark, charged with the murder of Phoene Bell, which occupie the attention of the court throughout the day was completed this evening. Whe lury went to their room at five sclock, and after being out half an hour brought in a verdict affirming that the plea that the accused on account of insanity is unnit to be placed on trial. The judge then ordered that the precuer be remanded to jail, there to await the pleasure of the fleutenant-governor.

Clark while in the court room lay on the floor the greater part of the day and was somewhat violent when taken from the court room. Mrs Amelia Clark, mother of the prisoner, was in the court throughout the trial and was called to the witness stand. She said that her son had fits during the early years of his life until he was nine years old and was subject to violent headaches. He lost his house by fire when he was about 28 years of age, and since that time did not take the same interest in his work. William and Clarence Clark, brothers of the accused, also were called and gave evidence.

Dr. J. V. Anglin, of St. John, one of the most important witnesses of the day, said he examined Clark at the Andover jail about one year ago and found no symptoms of insanity. He said he examined the prisoner last Tuesday and he had suspicions that he was feigning insanity. Dr. Anglin said that the symptoms displayed while in court were an unusual combination, and he would not say with certainty that the accused was insane, and his condition could only be ascertained 'after about two years' observation.

The court will be resumed in the norning. Three civil cases are on the docket to be disposed of-Tilly vs. Jensen, a land case; Gee vs. Turner, a case of trespass, and Craig vs. White, a suit to recover the balance claimed on pulpwood.


