**MORE ABOUT NEWSPRINT**

In considering any question a very great deal depends upon the point of view from which it is approached. The authorities at Ottawa have taken a most peculiar view of what is to be regarded as profiteering. We have during the last few weeks drawn attention to the situation as regards news print and other papers. In many lines of writing paper and envelopes the price has gone up over 100 per cent since 1914. The newsprint situation became acute last fall, when the manufacturers announced an arbitrary increase in prices. The matter was referred to the Minister of Finance by the publishers, and after due investigation by his department and consultation with manufacturers and publishers Sir Thomas White fixed a price. This price was never enforced, and later a second price was fixed as from March, which, so far as we know is still in effect. In the meantime a commission has been going to the whole matter, but with so little satisfaction to the publishers that their counsel withdrew from the proceedings. Three points stand out very clearly then. The first is that

either the Minister of Finance backed down before the manufacturers, or the "book-keepers" before he knew what he was doing. The second point is the date chosen by the government for the commencement of the prices promulgated by Order-in-Council. The manufacturers raised their prices from the fall of 1916, and the publishers in laying their case before the government naturally asked that whatever price was fixed should be made retroactive. Yet after all the government fixed a price as from March 1, which means that the publisher who bought his news-print supply before this date has no relief. The third point is that at no time has the government given any consideration to the publishers who bought through a jobbing house and for the most part all small publishers buy this way.

When these points are laid before the Minister of Finance he still refuses to see that the publishers have anything whatever to complain of. The reason for this is supplied by Commissioner Pringle the man whom the Minister of Finance appointed to inquire into the whole business. Commissioner Pringle affirms that the newspapers instead of complaining of the action of the Minister of Finance ought to be very grateful, as the manufacturers could sell every ton of paper they manufacture at a very much higher price in the United States of America. Precisely, and this is the whole secret of the situation. The war created a situation which the manufacturers are using to exploit even Canadian publishers. What they wanted was to make the home publishers pay as much for his news-print as the publisher in the United States. They have been asked to show the actual cost figures why there should have been such increases in the price of news-print. They were there with the figures and now their figures have to be tested. In the meantime the view of the commissioner, which is apparently also the view of the Minister of Finance, is that it is rather a hardship that the manufacturers have to supply the home market at all. They could make so much more out the American publishers that the commissioners' sympathies are naturally with them. If these are the view of the authorities at Ottawa it is indeed no wonder that profiteering is rampant throughout the Dominion.
