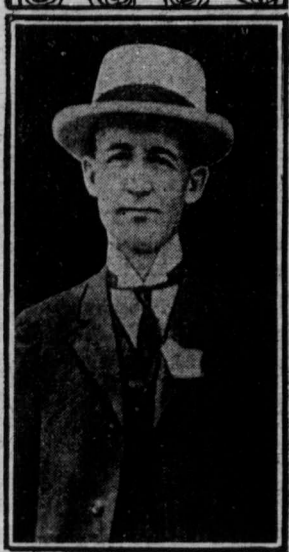
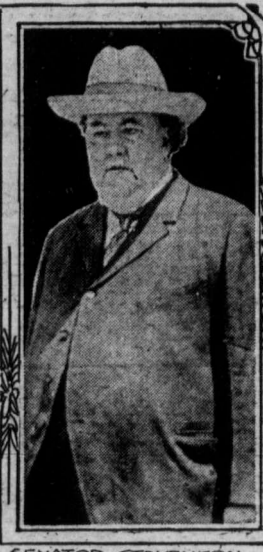

LYNCHED BY MOB

Atlanta, Ga., June 25.—Ann Boston, the negro woman who stabbed and killed Mrs. R. E. Jordan, wife of a prominent planter at Pinehurst and who was later taken from officers at Cordele by a mob, was lynched early this morning, according to a long-distance telephone message to a local newspaper.

After taking the woman from the officers, members of the mob put her in an automobile and set out for Pinehurst. Reaching there, according to the message, the woman was hanged on a tree.

GIRL PENETRATES
FUGITIVE'S MASK

King McNamara to Be Tried After Fourteen Years an Outlaw.

Lexington, Ky., June 21.—But for thoughtless remarks dropped while chatting with Miss Bettie Foss upon whom he called frequently, King McNamara, in jail here, charged with murder, might still be the dapper veterinarian, Dr. James Baker, of Louisville. The woman, while receiving the attentions of the man, arrived at the belief that her caller was none other than the much wanted King McNamara, of the McNamara family, which for years had been in the public eyes because of tragedies in which the brothers were either the slayers or victims, and for whom the officers of every State in the Union were looking, with the idea of obtaining a reward offered by the State and friends of Jacob S. Keller.

It is charged that King McNamara thirteen years ago killed Keller. The young woman knew that Dr. Baker had come to Lexington to attend the funeral of his mother. He had told her of family connections and incidents which led her to believe that he was using a false name. This decision was reached with much difficulty, as McNamara had so many friends, dressed so well and was so attentive to business. Finally the girl ceased to play the sweetheart and turned detective. She was not long in becoming convinced and communicated with the police here with the result that Dr. Baker was arrested and spirited away from Louisville. McNamara will be placed on trial here July 2.

GOVERNMENT HAS
REDEEMED PLEDGES

Hon. Mr. Crothers Reviews the Excellent Record of the Borden Government.

Toronto, June 22.—Warm and enthusiastic was the reception tendered to Hon. T. W. Crothers, Minister of Labor, at the rally of Conservatives on the grounds of the Centre and South Toronto Conservative Club Wednesday evening. The substantiation of the pledges of the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and his colleagues when before the country was demonstrated by reference to legislation since passed, whereas in reviewing the political situation of the past Hon. Mr. Crothers referred to the unsportsmanlike attitude of the Liberal party. The speaker was introduced by Mr. Arthur Van-koughnet, President of the Club, and on arising to address the meeting he was given a tremendous ovation.

Mr. Borden's Proud Record.

"The present Administration has been in office but eight months and during that time they have redeemed more pledges in Opposition than did their predecessors in fifteen years," he declared.

"When in Opposition, Mr. Borden realizing the great advantage of good roads, especially to the farmers, promised substantial aid to their construction throughout Canada and had an Act passed by the Commons providing for a grant of \$1,000,000 as a commencement for this year. But the Senate refused their assent. An Act was passed by the Commons providing for payment of \$2,000,000 to the Province of Ontario as a subsidy for railways constructed by the Government thereof, at the same rate per mile as it has been the practice to contribute to companies doing like work, but again the Senate refused their assent."

Premier Triumphs.

"Mr. Borden, knowing that agriculture is the basic industry of Canada," continued the speaker, "promised it special aid and encouragement, and enacted a statute thereof under which Ontario gets this year as a commencement \$175,000.

"Large questions of a delicate, irritating and serious character concerning boundaries, public lands and viticultural subsidies and other matter between the Dominion and Manitoba had been of many years standing and had been from time to time put aside by Sir Wilfrid Laurier lest a dealing with them might weaken him with many of his friends. But Mr. Borden boldly grappled with them and these questions which threatened to become extremely ugly were settled for all time in a manner satisfactory to all concerned."

Free Rural Delivery.

He referred to the fact that free rural delivery is being established as rapidly as the means of the Government will admit and reviewed the length the grants made for the extension and construction of railways for the opening to settlement of vast areas now uncultivated. The Grain Act, giving great promise of a solution of the grain question to the satisfaction of the western farmer, was another piece of advanced legislation passed by the Borden Government.

"The marriage question was besetting discord among the people and Mr. Borden recognized the necessity of removing it from the sphere of controversy. Appropriate questions were speedily submitted to the Supreme Court of Canada to be followed by an appeal to the highest tribunal in the Empire. People of all shades of thought at once saw and accepted the wisdom of this course," he continued.

Acts of Administration.

"In acts of administration our record of eight months is no less creditable. Look at a few illustrations. The Postmaster General has opened 394 new post offices—an average of nearly two per day; 228 new Money Order Offices; 530 new Postal Note Offices; increased the annual mileage on stage mail routes 1833 miles; 418 new mail routes in operation in Ontario; about 400 new proposed routes now under advertisement."

"All labor troubles have been promptly adjusted. More than one of them we inherited from our predecessors."

Looking After Labor.

"We are seeing to it that Government contractors pay at least the wages current in the various localities and that men employed thereon are otherwise fairly treated. By a careful gathering of pertinent statistics and by personal inspection, we are striving to attain the condition of labor throughout the country with the view to the maintenance or restoration of industrial peace, so essential to our highest well."

WON'T HOLD UP
THE BIG FIGHT

Santa Fe, N. M., June 25.—There will be no interference with the Johnson-Flynn battle for the world's heavyweight championship, at Las Vegas on July 4th, by Governor McDonald, provided the county and city authorities "enforce strictly the state law," for suppression of public gambling. This was made plain in an official statement issued by Governor McDonald today. But should the civil authorities fail to enforce the laws, the governor declares that "all the power that possibly can be brought into use, will be directed to destroy the evil and vice attending upon the gathering."

In view of the absence of specific legal prohibition Governor McDonald adds that all he can do is to enforce strictly existing laws regarding gambling.
