

Political Notes.

Dr. Tupper was enthusiastically received by the members of the Junior Conservative Club on Monday, Mr. C. P. Davidson, the President, presiding. Mr. Tupper claimed that the Liberal Conservative party was composed of the best men of the two old parties, and he was proud of the title they bore. The McKenzie Government, which claimed to be Liberal, had said, not placed on the statute book one single reform measure giving the people more of a voice in public affairs than they had previously had. The great line of demarcation between the two parties arose out of their different trade policies. The Liberals had argued that it was impossible to make the country prosperous by Act of Parliament, but he held that it was possible to legislate so as to destroy the sugar trade, the wool trade, it was equally possible by judicious legislation to restore them. He believed the coming elections would bring about a change of Government, and this he prophesied confidently although neither a prophet nor the son of a prophet.

Waterbury vs. Dewe.

The Jury, after an absence of two hours, to-day returned into Court and answered the questions submitted to them by His Honor, as follows:—and returned their verdict for the plaintiff assessing damages at \$6,000.—Do you find the words charged in the first count of the declaration, spoken in the presence of Mr. Waterbury, addressed to Mr. Woodrow, heard by any other person?—The Jury find no evidence presented that any other person heard the words spoken by Mr. Dewe in making the communication to Mr. Woodrow, but they also find that Mr. Dewe took no precaution to prevent it being heard, the door into the common room being open.

The Criminal Mystery.

In the Advocate's Library, yesterday, the law student assembled to hear the report of the committee appointed to investigate the circumstances connected with the death of the late Mr. Crimmin, of Chatham, N. B. The committee had engaged the services of an able detective who after diligent search, was unable to obtain any trace of the deceased after he was in the Union House. No information or consequence resulted from the investigation, and the whole affair is still shrouded in as deep a mystery as ever.

FREE TRADERS tell us that not only would Protection be the means of driving the Maritime Provinces out of the Confederation, but that it would ruin our carrying trade. In this, however, as in many other cases, they are entirely mistaken. Not only would Protection bind the different Provinces closer together, but it would create an inter-provincial carrying trade of gigantic proportions. A recent issue of an influential journal published in Halifax says that if the people of the West are willing to give them concessions in favour of their coal, iron and refined sugar, they are willing to meet us halfway by granting concessions in favour of our wheat, flour and manufactured articles. This is exactly what we want; the tariff could easily be adjusted so as to satisfy those different interests, and thereby create a healthy and lively commercial intercourse between the people of the different provinces, and thus more closely cement the bonds of Confederation. It is easy, however, to look for this until we obtain a change of Government, till we have other than "fly on the wheel" statesmen and legislators.

MUSIC.—The Band of the 73rd Battalion was out for practice on Wednesday evening for the first time since the season, and took their stand on Haymarket Square for about an hour, during which time a large crowd gathered to listen to some very nice music. Much surprise was expressed at the proficiency of the band, and the interest manifested at the marked improvement made by the Band since last season. We hope the citizens will (now) that we have material for a first rate band, give the members tangible encouragement to enable them to acquire that proficiency which will cause them to be a credit to Chatham.—Gleaner.

Mr. Gavin Rainnie, who has held responsible positions on the Government railway in the Province almost ever since we had a railway, has resigned his position of trackmaster on the demand of Mr. Brydges. The offence with which Mr. Rainnie (whom no person doubts as a most able and competent man) is charged is of an absurdly childish character, as to strengthen the rumor that his real crime is *Conscientiousness*—the object of the railway authority being to intimidate other employees on the line, nearly all of whom are known to be affected with a first rate band of more or less rank form. If the I. C. R. is going to be run as a political machine to aid the Grits at the coming elections, and if an attempt is really being made to strike terror into the breasts of Conservative employees, it is right that the country should know it.—Post.

FENIANISM DENOUNCED.—We clip the following sensible remarks from the New York *Catholic Review* of the 11th inst.:—"We are not apprehensive that any of the readers of the *Catholic Review* can be deluded into taking part in the insane attempt to 'organize' Irish attacks on Canada, and enlist Irishmen for service on Russian ships, of which we are hearing rumors. But each of our readers may have it in his power to do much good by dropping a word here and there in deprecation of all these absurd and

wicked schemes to obtain money and to trade in lives. There are no more atrocious swindles which are bad enough; but the Irishman who now pretends that he is about to organize a corps of Irish-American volunteers for Russia service on sea or land is doing a very evil turn to those who may trust in him. We are as anxious for the freedom and the happiness of Ireland as he is, but we are not prepared to believe that there is any foundation for the rumors that are in circulation concerning Irish enlistments and so on; but if there be, we advise our readers to exert influence in persuading their less enlightened friends to have nothing to do with such schemes."

A RAT BITE CASE.—A gentleman residing at the North end was awakened from a dream of peace at an early hour yesterday morning by a sharp cry, and on looking out of his window he saw a rat running on the roof of his house. He took time to gather his senses, and then put his hand to the affected spot, where he found a small, but very painful bump. He made an attempt to capture the rodent but it escaped.—*Hfx. Herald*.

The Point Rich lighthouse keeper reports having found on shore there, on the 20th October last, a brigantine of 120 tons, marked P. R. C. of Pictou. The vessel was lying on her side, with all sails set, and was full of water. The hull was not damaged. There were 220 barrels of herrings on board and a number of empty barrels.—*Standard*.

Elizabeth, N. Y., May 31.—The Trenton passenger train on the Pennsylvania Railroad ran into a funeral procession at North Avenue crossing, today. It struck a hearse, killed both horses, crushed the driver's skull and broke his leg and arm; two old men in the carriage were badly hurt, but not fatally.
