DEEPLY REGRETTED. QUEBEC BRIDGE.

Death of Miss Allan-Sudden Death of Infant. The unexpected ending of a life of promise as well as true achievement in her own circles of activity took place on Sunday last in the sudden death of Miss Mary W. A. Allan, of 144 Queen street south, widely known and highly esteemed in musical circles.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, and was largely attended. Rev. D. B. Drummond and Rev. F. E. Howitt conducted the service; and Rev. Mr. Drummond officiated at the grave. The pall-bearers were her four brothers, George, Richard, Thomas and John Allan, and her brothers-in-law, William Scott and James Cook.

William Evans, an old resident of this city, passed away this morning in his 74th year. Deceased was a carpenter, and had lived in the city for 65 years. He leaves a widow, two sons, William and James. The funeral will take place from the late home of his son, James Evans, 28 Tuckett street, on Wednesday at 3.30 p.m.

Richard Hornby, who passed away on Saturday afternoon at his late residence, 54 Ferris street west, was 59 years of age. He was born in Manchester, England. A widow, one son, Ernest, and three daughters, Misses May, Maud and Stella, survive. Deceased was a member of Dundas Lodge, I. O. O. F. The funeral took place this afternoon. Rev. I. O. O. F. conducted the services, and the pall-bearers were members of the I. O. O. F.

JURY VISITED THE SCENE AND WERE TO MEET AGAIN TO-DAY

The Break Was in the Superstructure. Engineers and Officials Flocking to the Scene-Preparations for a Street Government Inquiry-Funeral of a Number of the Victims.

Quebec, Sept. 3.-Matters remain very much in statu quo with regard to the Quebec bridge disaster, save that the people here are gradually recovering from the stupefaction with which the news of the catastrophe was received. Although careful watch has been kept all yesterday and to-day, both at the bridge and in the river below, no more bodies have been recovered, and it is believed that most of the sixty-one missing dead are still pinned under the wreckage, two hundred feet below the surface of the river.

A jury was empanelled on Saturday morning, and the fifteen bodies so far taken from the river were formally identified, and burial permits issued by Coroner Jolicoeur. The jury also visited the scene of the accident, and spent several hours going over the ruins. They then adjourned until Tuesday morning, when they will again meet. Several of the deceased have been identified, and their bodies buried at St. Rochald yesterday afternoon, and the funerals were attended by enormous crowds of sympathizing friends from the village as well as from this city.

New York, Sept. 3.-Theodore Cooper, of 45 Broadway, the consulting engineer in the construction of the Quebec bridge over the St. Lawrence River, received a telegram from T. A. Hoare, the chief engineer employed by the Canadian Government, giving his findings after a first and somewhat cursory examination of the wreck. Mr. Hoare reported that the foundations were in good condition, and thus the fault is limited to the structure above them. "The huge eye bars above the coping in the anchor are bent," the telegram said, "the pressure being toward the west, the displacement of the span took place. It looks as if the failure was near the main post. Mr. Hoare's message goes on: "The entire structure collapsed vertically."

The idea of any machinery weight on the growing span causing it to creep is not worth considering," said Mr. Cooper yesterday.

In the little village of Caughnawaga, just across from Lachine, the half-breed and Indian are mourning the loss of probably forty souls. They are not sure yet of just how many, but the names of thirty dead tell a tale of anguish that any attempt at description will fail to amplify. The village is in tears. There are few, if any, homes which are not affected directly or indirectly by the disaster, and many are mourning the loss of their loved ones. Some of the bodies are already recovered and are awaiting the action of the coroner. From the village two hundred poor people left here at 12 o'clock for the stricken shore.

President Parent, of the Quebec Bridge Company, has spent most of the last two days at the wreck, and to-day was joined by Messrs. Holgate and Kerry, of Montreal, who have been appointed by the Dominion government to undertake the inquiry, while Mr. Galbraith, of Toronto, the third member of the board, is expected to arrive here tomorrow. Mr. Parent stated that he had a meeting with Mr. Schuyler, the designer of the bridge, and spent most of the day examining the wreck. On their return Mr. Deans had an interview with President Parent, of the Bridge Company. Later Mr. Deans declined to discuss the matter, further than to state that his information was that up to the morning of last Thursday there had not been the slightest indication of trouble that every detail of the bridge worked out according to plans and the construction work seemed to be going on splendidly.

Many pitiful stories of the disaster are being told of those who went to aid in the rescue. Several were compelled to witness the gradual drowning of men who were pinned down and could not get away, being slowly suffocated by the rising water. One man in particular was pinned by the foot in the centre of the wreckage, and held for hours before the rising waters put an end to his agonies. He shouted to the rescuers to chop off his foot with an axe and get him out, but they were quite unable to reach him, and could do nothing but witness his dreadful death.

The bereavement among individual families is simply appalling. One Indian, J. B. Daileault, who was present at the inquest, stated that he had lost four brothers, four cousins and one brother-in-law.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.-Major Ponsonby has called to Lord Grey as follows: "Married, Aug. 31.-The King grieves to hear news of disaster to Quebec bridge. Wishes you to convey his heartfelt sympathy with relatives and friends of all who have lost their lives in the sad calamity. (Signed) Ponsonby."
