

OBITUARY.

Funeral of Mrs. Mills—Mr. Cowan
Burned in Toronto.

All that is mortal of the late Mrs. Chas. Mills, West avenue south, was laid away in the silent tomb this afternoon in Hamilton cemetery. Rev. R. J. Treleven conducted the religious service at the house and grave. The pallbearers were Messrs. Chas. W. Bradfield, John McArthur, E. W. Thomas, Wm. Hill, James Mackay and C. J. Smith (Buffalo). Many beautiful floral offerings were received, some being from friends in distant points.

The funeral of the late Mr. Alfred Webber, who died at Vancouver, B. C., on Tuesday of last week, will take place tomorrow at 2.30 from the residence of his brother, Mr. John A. Webber, 130 Stinson street.

Miss Sarah A. Hales died yesterday morning at the residence of her sister, 102 Stevens street. Deceased is a native of Kingston, Ont. The funeral will take place on Thursday, 3.30 p.m., from the above address.

With every evidence of popular esteem the remains of the late Mr. J. W. Cowan, the well-known cocoa manufacturer, were laid to rest in Mount Pleasant cemetery, Toronto, yesterday afternoon. The funeral took place from the family residence, 105 St. George street, at 3 o'clock, and was very largely attended by the best-known business men of the city and old friends of the deceased, some of whom came from Hamilton and Brantford. Rev. Elmore Harris conducted the services, being assisted by Rev. John MacNeill, B.A., of Walmer Road Church, and Rev. W. H. Porter. The pallbearers were Messrs. J. McFarlane, of Hamilton, Joseph Shennstone, Chancellor A. C. McKay, of McMaster University, Henry Peters, George Stanway and George Musson.

IN OVEN TOO LONG.

Why Mr. Springstead's Bread Was
Light—Fined \$40.

"I have no sympathy for bakers who sell short weight bread. They shorten the weight of the bread and get it down as light as they can and raise the price as high as they can and the increase is just about twice as big as is apparent, and then they sell it even shorter in weight than their labels call for, which is low enough. In reference to the new bread bill now before the House of the Province a maximum penalty of \$5 a loaf is provided for when the baker is found to be short in weight. I'll fix that fine if you want me to—there are 227 loaves." Thus spoke Magistrate Jelfs to F. Morison, solicitor, in police court this morning when Mr. Morison pleaded guilty on behalf of E. Springstead to selling light-weight bread and asked for leniency under the new bill before the House. Mr. Morison dropped his argument and explained the great trouble it was to get bread the right weight. The only way it can be weighed, he said, is before it is cooked and with an allowance of 2½ ounces for shrinkage it should come out right, but this was probably in the oven a little longer than the rest, hence the greater shrinkage in weight and size. The magistrate fined Mr. Springstead \$40.

Judgment was entered against James Bolton, 251 King street east, for \$5 wages which A. Davis claimed. John Swazie, James street north, was fined \$2 for being out on a spree last night.

CREEGGAN'S CASE.

Has Settled Financial Affairs With
Thorold Council.

(Special Despatch to the Times.)
St. Catharines, April 8.—The long-standing trouble between Thorold Town Council and Ex-Tax Collector P. C. Creegan has finally been settled. Creegan was arrested at Cobden, near Renfrew, a week ago, when he was in charge of a branch office for Dr. Winter, a Renfrew dentist, and was brought back by Chief Mair of the Ontario Police force at Niagara Falls, on a charge of embezzlement, preferred by Chief of Police Shee, of Thorold. The charge was based on Creegan's failure to turn over to the Town Treasurer all the tax moneys he collected, the shortage, according to the report of special auditor E. B. Patterson, amounting to about \$24. Creegan is now in Welland County Jail awaiting trial before Police Magistrate Cruickshank, at Niagara Falls, the Magistrate at Thorold, being also Town Clerk, having declined to take the case. Creegan's brother, Rev. Alfred Creegan, of Deseronto, came to Thorold on Monday and in conjunction with the wife of the Ex-Collector, arranged for the payment of the money owing to the town. The hearing will take place at Niagara Falls on Friday.

WILL BE PAID.

Touring Kilties Will Get Money For
Their Services.

T. P. J. Power, manager of the touring Kilties' band, in a letter to the Intelligence, of Belleville, where the band was organized, gives satisfactory explanations about the recent trouble, referred to in the Times. He says: "I am very glad to be in a position to say that the tour just closed was a success, both musically and financially, in spite of the great money stringency. The tour was in ten months, and every week showed a profit from May 20th until the bank panic came on, especially through the Canadian West; then business fell flat and we began to draw from the treasury of the Kilties' Band Company, incorporated at New York, some of the thousands that had been sent in from the earnings of the early part of the tour. When the band reached Vandalia, Ill., the president of the Kilties received a letter from the treasurer of the company, who is vice-president of the Queen's County Trust Bank, in New York, saying he would forward no more money until he received the weekly reports, which he claimed the president had neglected to send for the past two months. The members of the band were very indignant at receiving such news, and justly so, in view of the fact that the tour had been such a huge success. In a letter from the president, received to-day (April 6th), he says all claims will be paid as soon as he can make out the statements and forward same to the directors of the company. The 16th tour is scheduled to open on the 24th May.

NEW COURT RULES.

Ontario's Judges Seek to Simplify
Practice.

At a meeting of the Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario, held at Toronto on Friday, 27th March, 1908, it was ordered that the following rules be adopted, viz.:

1280.—In all cases in which it is desired to move to quash a conviction, or order, warrant or injunction, the proceeding shall be by a notice of motion in the first instance, instead of by certiorari, or by rule or order nisi.

1290.—The notice shall be served at least six days before the return day thereof, upon the Magistrate, Justice or Justices making the conviction or order, or issuing the warrant, or the Coroner making the inquisition, and also upon the prosecutor or informant (if any), and upon the Clerk of the Peace, if the proceedings have been returned to his office, and it shall specify the objections intended to be raised.

1291.—Upon the notice of motion shall be indorsed a copy of rule number 1280, together with a notice in the following form, addressed to the Magistrate, Justice or Justices, Coroner or Clerk of the Peace, as the case may be:

"You are hereby required forthwith, after service hereof, to return to the central office at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, the conviction (or as the case may be) herein referred to, together with the information and evidence, if any, and all things touching the matter as fully and entirely as they remain in your custody together with the notice."

"To A. B.,
Magistrate at
"C. D.,
Solicitor for the applicant."

1292.—Upon receiving the notice so endorsed, the Magistrate, Justice or Justices, Coroner or Clerk of the Peace, shall return forthwith to the central office at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, the conviction, order, warrant or injunction, together with the information and evidence, if any, and all things touching the matter, and the notice served upon him, with a certificate endorsed thereon in the following form:

"Pursuant to the accompanying notice, I herewith return to this honorable court the following papers and documents, that is to say:

"(1) The conviction (or as the case may be);
"(2) The information and the warrant issued thereon;
"(3) The evidence taken at the hearing;
"(4) Any other papers or documents touching the matter."

"And I hereby certify to this Honorable Court that I have above truly set forth all the papers and documents in my custody or power relating to the matter set forth in the said notice of motion."

A copy of this rule shall be annexed to the notice of motion served upon the Magistrate, Justice or Justices, Coroner or Clerk of the Peace, from whom the return is required.

1293.—The certificate shall have the same effect as a return to a writ of certiorari, or to an order under consolidated rule 1101 of the Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario.

1294.—The notice shall be returnable before a Judge of the High Court sitting in chambers, or before the Magistrate, Justice or Justices, Coroner or Clerk of the Peace, from whom the return is required.

1295.—The motion shall not be entertained unless the return day thereof be within six months after the conviction, order, warrant or injunction, or unless the applicant is shown to have entered into a recognizance with one or more sureties in the sum of \$100 before a Justice or Justices of the county within which the conviction or order or injunction was made, or the warrant issued, or before a Judge of the County Court of the said county, or before a Judge of the Superior Court, and which recognizance with an affidavit of the due execution thereof shall be filed with the Registrar of the court in which such motion is made or is pending or unless the applicant is shown to have made the deposit of the like sum of \$100 with the Registrar of the court in which such motion is made with or upon the condition that he will prosecute such application at his own costs and charges without any writ or affected delay, and that he will pay the person in whose favor the conviction, order, or other proceedings is affirmed his full costs and charges to be taxed according to the course of the court, in case the conviction, order or other proceeding is affirmed.

1296.—The Judge shall have all the powers of the court in the like matters and may order the production of papers and documents as he may deem necessary.

1297.—An appeal shall lie from the order of the Judge to a Divisional Court if leave be granted by a Judge of the High Court.

1298.—All rules and parts of rules inconsistent with the next preceding nine rules are hereby repealed.

The foregoing rules shall come into force and take effect from and after the confirmation thereof of an act of the Legislature of Ontario.

At a meeting of the Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario, held on Friday, 27th of March, 1908, it was ordered that the following amendments to the rules be adopted, viz.:

TO THE JURY TO-NIGHT. Bowin's Trial is Nearing an End at Detroit. Detroit, Mich., April 7.—The testimony in the case of Percy Bowin was completed this afternoon, and the case will go to the jury to-morrow night if the arguments are completed.
