

MR. DAVITT'S SPEECH

The following is an extract from the speech, delivered from Armagh, Ireland, which led Mr. Davitt's arrest. After explaining the objects and aims of the Land League he went on to say:—

"The movement which has been called into existence by the democracy of Ireland is one which must triumph over all opposing obstacles, as it is in line with justice, reason, and social progress, while resting on principles as indestructible as the evils against which it is directed are notoriously self-evident and perishable. This is a movement, then, Orangemen, Armagh, which your common sense and social aspirations have prompted you to come here today to support, and if you should in the intelligent resolve of your earnest desire which now fills a place in the mind of every other Irishman who has toiled by his sweat and labor from day to day, you will continue to support the land league that measures active assistance which will enable it to win for you and your children the sole enjoyment of the fruits of that labor (cheers for the land league). The aristocratic drones who swallow your earnings in the past, and snatch from your families the food which your industry has produced, and now finding that you are no longer the tame and superstitious fools who fought for their amusement and profit with your equally foolish and superstitious Catholic fellow workers, and allowed the landlords to pick both your pockets during the encounter (cheers). My friends, the landlords of Ireland are all one religion—their God is common and rack-rents, and evictions their only code of morality, while the toilers of the fields, whether Orangemen, Catholics, Presbyterians, Methodists, are the victims whom they desire to see themselves benefited by the juggernaut of landlordism while showing their own degradation and their country's shame (cheers). Let them read in this meeting to-day, in this gathering of Irishmen, no longer enemies because you worship your Creator in different ways, no longer strangers in the land which will ever harbor Protestant patriotism as well as Catholic fidelity, the religious feuds shall perish in just and moral struggle for common rights against the common enemy of Irish hearts and homes. Look across the undulating plains which stretch from the meeting to-day, and which the snow cannot hide, and picture the rest of our fertile country so blessed by Nature's lavish gifts, and say why poverty and misery should find a home where a generous soil, teeming rivers, and a genial climate should give assurance of a prosperous and happy existence. Ask yourselves if it is not human rather than the natural agency which condemns our country to perennial desolation."
