SPEED EECCEDS

When the engineer charried down from the ear of the Canadian Pacific Railway's fast Overseas Mad train, at Meatreal Junction recently, he had just brought his train in from what in the fastest run that has yet been made between Quabon and Montreal. Not only was the previous record beaten, but it was so badly mangled that it is now hardly recognizable as the best previous time. Owing to the various steamably delays the operating efficials had been advised to rush the Overseas medifrom Quebec and rush it they did with a vergeance, the train putting away an average of mearly forty-five miles an hour for the whole trip of 167.5 miles. Leaving Quebec at 7.05 the train reached Montreal Junction, at 11.30 p.m. making the journey in three hours and flity-five minutes. The best previous time for this trip was four hours and flity-five minutes so that the old record was broken by flity-five minutes. This however is not the whole of the story because shortly after the time for the West bound Overseas mail was made known, word was flashed from Quebec that the East bound train had also broken the best previous record. The time for this trian was four hours and seven minutes, which while not as good as the West bound train's time was nevertheless good enough to beat the former time by thirty three minutes. Both trains were made up of five cars.

PLANTING IMPORTED

POTATO ES!

In view of the great scarcity of potators in several sections of the province and that many hundreds of barrets have been imported from Great Britain, our farmers should real ze the danger of introducing one of the most serious potato diseases yet known, by planting this imported seed. The ciscase known as "Black. Sea." "Warty Disease" "Caulificer Disease" or more properly "Potato Canket" has been spreading rapidly in European countries during the last fifteen years. It was first known in England in 1901. It was imported to Nawfoundland in 1908, and there is grave danger of its inif European potatoes that have been made during the past Winter. Any one wishing tuit unformation in regard to this actions disease may obtain it by addressing TH Gussow, Botanist & the Lominton Experimental Parm, Orava, requesting a copy of Luli-tin No. 63. After obtain the information contained in Mr. Gussow's bulletin, no poteto planter will wish to risk introducing this very viru'ent and distructive disease to his land the disease comes from spores which are introduced into the land from the infected seed potatoes It is stated these spores will live, in anen once infected is not safe again for potatoes for years, The algests is said not to be noticible while the Synopsis of Canadian Northwest potato is greving, but when narvesting begins it will be found that in some cases the whole hill is destroyed, in other cases the


