St. Dunstan's College.

The closing examination and distribution of prizes took place at St. Dunstan's College on Tuesday, the 22nd instant.

The examinations of the different classes commenced at 9 o'clock, a.m., and were conducted by His Lordship the Bishop, Very Rev. James McDonald, V. G.; Rev. Angus McDonald, Rev. P. Doyle, Rev. W. H. Grant, Professor Caven, Messrs. John McEwan, Edward Roche, T. Foley, Dr. Conroy and S. R. Jenkins, and several others. The students acquitted themselves most creditably.

The distribution of prizes took place at 3 o'clock, p.m., in the main hall of the College, which was suitably decorated for the occasion.

In addition to the clergymen already mentioned, there were present Revs. A. J. McDonald, James Ross, E. Hackett, Esq., M. P., George W. A. Burke, and some others. The distinguished visitors, besides those already mentioned, were His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McDonald; Judge Kelly, of Summerside; E. Hackett, Esq., M. P.; George W. A. Burke, Esq., M. P.; Mr. Sullivan, Mrs. Judge Rodin, Mrs. A. C. McDonald, Mrs. Walker, Miss DeBlois, Miss Pop, and several others.

The Rev. Rector read the half yearly bulletin, which showed that the conduct, proficiency and general standing of the students was deserving of the highest praise. He also stated that the number of students attending this year was double that of the former year. The students were then called up to receive the rewards of their labors during the year. The prizes were presented by Mr. McDonald. The distribution having been finished, Master C. A. Campbell read an excellent address in which he thanked His Lordship for the interest he always manifested in the College; the Rev. Rector and the Professors for their kindness and attention to the wants of the students, and the visitors for their presence on the occasion.

His Lordship then read an address in French. His Lordship the Bishop then addressed the students in French. He thanked them for the kind wishes contained in the address which had just been read, and addressed to them words of wise counsel as to the manner in which they should conduct themselves, not only during their college days, but all through life.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor congratulated the students on their good conduct, and the diligence with which they had attended to their studies, as evinced by the report read by the Rev. Rector. He said that their success in life would depend, in a great degree, on their putting into practice what they had been taught in college. George W. DeBlois, Esq., congratulated the students on the great success which had attended their labors during the past year. He said he never saw so many prizes as one of their neighbors had borne the highest testimony to the conduct of the boys who had attended the College at all times. The College, he said, afforded every comfort that students could desire. In conclusion he wished them a pleasant vacation.

Judge Kelly delivered a very good address. He joined with the previous speakers in congratulating the students on their good conduct and diligence in their studies. He showed the advantages to be derived from this institution, and said that many more parents might send their children here than do at present.

Mr. Hackett spoke of the advantages of making a course of studies in this College. He drew out the benefits of a classical education, and, above all, he said the education of the heart, as a foundation. In conclusion, he said His Lordship deserved the greatest praise for his exertions in behalf of this institution.

The Rev. Rector thanked all those who had kindly given prizes, and made the pleasing announcement that Malcolm McLeod, Esq., had donated the sum of twenty dollars to be invested in prizes next year. He availed himself of this opportunity, he said, to express his sincere thanks to this gentleman for his generous gift.
