NEWS OF THE WEEK.

About a foot of snow fell on Friday last in Montreal.

Two thousand dollars worth of furs were stolen from Trudel & Graham's store, Montreal, on the 11th.

The Bank of Montreal's half-yearly statement shows a balance carried forward to profit and loss account of \$981,823, an increase of \$20,118 on the last half year.

At Winnipeg, on Wednesday last, the negro Paul Brown, murderer of Wilbur E. Burton, was sentenced to be hanged on December 23rd.

The severest penalty of the Swiss law—life imprisonment, was imposed upon Luigi Leoncini, the assassin of the Empress Elizabeth of Austria.

Serious damage is reported to have been done in many districts in the South of Ireland caused by the overflowing of the rivers in Kerry owing to unusually heavy rainfalls.

Eight robbers held up a Great Northern Railway train five miles west of Pergus Falls, Minn., on Thursday night last, and carried off a large amount of money from an express car safe which they blew open.

Owing to the success of the formation of the beaver company at Halifax, orators for the establishment of such in Montreal and other cities will be held by the department at Ottawa.

The proposal of Russia to make Prince George of Greece High Commissioner of the powers in the island of Crete has been accepted by Great Britain, France and Italy.

Germany and Austria have been ineffectually appealing to the Turkish government, against the appointment.

In the Lord Mayor's Show which took place in London, on the 10th, the interest of the spectators was principally centered in the car representing the English people and that showing the Russian with the soldiers of the regiment who took part in the battle of Omdurman.
