The season was a very successful one, especially as regards the shooting, which shows a higher average than any previous year, a general improvement being made all along the line. Many of our younger shots advanced ten points over the previous year's shooting. This is matter for congratulation, and the splendid hooting of Mr. J. F. Murphy is worthy of special mention. It sets next high standard and has created increased interest in rifle shooting in Hogan, left on Sunday last by the S. Newfoundland, and will spur on many promising younger shots to emulate
