### **Had Narrow** Escape.

The six men of a crew and a woman passenger of the schr. Fannie C., of 28 tons had a terrible time of it according to the crew of the Ingraham. the vessel was bound from St. Bacalieu Tickle all Friday until 3 p. m., but strange to say though it was terribly stormy here she had it quite calm until 3 p.m. when a snow storm from 3 till 11 p.m.—dec2,3i ourst upon her and an effort was made to reach Carbonear. In doing so most of her canvas was blown away and the three anchors which were let go broke away and she was driven in over the shoals at Mosquito Point and away and soon she filled with water which went over the cabin floor. She was driven in under the cliff and death stared all on board in the face. They took to their boat and were two hours rowing and were drenched with the spray and snow and suffering terribly from cold before they could get a place to land. They got ashore at a beach near the entrance to Mosquito and most o fthe people had to remain n their wet clothing until they landed in Harbor Grace yesterday. They had a terrible time of it, and cannot

understand how the vessel after striking did not go to pieces in the heavy sea running. At daylight yesterday the Ingraham towed the vessel off and brought her to Harbor Grace. She was submerged with only 10 feet of her masts above water and in dition was towed along and beached at Harbor Grace. Yesterday two of her crew narrowly escaped drifting in on the breakers at Harbor Grace and being drowned. Two staples in the bow and stern of the boat gave out as is really the best. 
