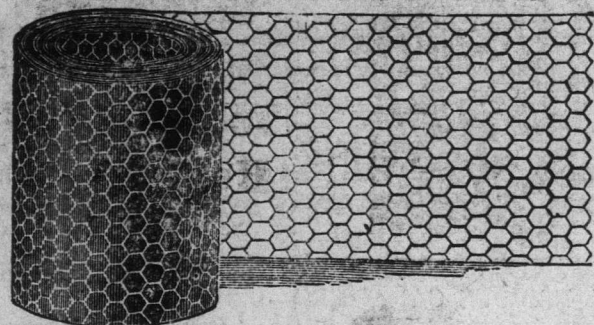

Royal Commission's
Report on Nfld.

The Dominion Royal Commission visited Newfoundland, it will be remembered last summer. The Commissioners report they have completed their enquiries about Newfoundland. A copy of that report has been sent to us by the Deputy Colonial Secretary, Mr. Arthur Mow. As might be expected, there is practically nothing in the report which is new to Newfoundlanders. The value of the report depends on the probability that a report from a Dominion Royal Commission will bring facts that are well known here before the world of investors. The report shows that the overseas trade of Newfoundland is large per head of the population, due mainly to the fact that most of what we produce we export and most of what we consume we import. The per capita overseas trade of Newfoundland is given as \$25.5; that of Canada as \$20.7 and that of the United States as \$29.9.

The Commissioners remark that the importance of adequate steamship communication to a community thus dependent on overseas markets and sources of supply is evident. Incidentally, we may remark it shows how dependent Newfoundland is on the Royal Navy in keeping sea routes open.

Figures are given showing the marked increase in this trade from 1902-4 to 1912-13 which draws from the Commissioners the statement: "This remarkable development has been attained without any considerable increase of population. It arises in the main from the more intense occupation of the people, due to the establishment of new, and the expansion of existing industries in the island."

Mr. O'Driscoll Explains
His Position

WITH REGARD TO THE IRON PIPE ORDER.

Editor Evening Telegram:

Dear Mr. Editor.—Re my position with regard to the recent purchase of iron pipe by the City Commission, my first intimation of the Board's action was given me by a member who said they were looking for prices on a very large quantity of iron piping, and on enquiry through Mr. Longley they could save several thousand dollars to the city by buying in the American market, and furthermore he thought it was my firm Mr. Longley got the price of \$22.70 per ton and a little later he submitted another price of \$23.30, as freights had advanced.

In the meantime I took up the matter with my principals and wrote the Commissioners that I expected they would give me the authorized agent a chance to figure direct. Being a citizen and tax payer I naturally looked on this as my right, and furthermore the enquiry made by Mr. Longley to my firm showed he went to the best people in the business for prices, and had the interest of our city at heart, but I think his interest should then be left for the Commissioners to take the matter up with me.

At the next meeting of the Board my letter was read and I was asked to quote, which I did and submitted my price of \$22.80, as against Mr. Longley's of \$23.20, but to the surprise of Longley, whether through instinct or not must have found out something and noted \$20.00 less than your humble servant. I was made aware of this and immediately telegraphed my firm as follows: "New York quotations 2.40 cts. net, ten less than on must beat that price to secure business. Not receiving an answer for three days and thinking my firm was too disgusted to enter any further into the business I mentioned your Telegram Tuesday."

John's Municipal Board waiting my answer, it is possible for you to meet the quotations supplied by Mr. Longley? Please answer.

I received the following on the 26th of March: "We understand price mentioned your Telegram Tuesday was made in error and subsequently withdrawn and further that price of \$22.80 is well in line with quotations other makers submitted to Longley, if absolutely necessary we might reduce our figure very slightly, and as you are not a member of St. John's Municipal Board and will wire us we will immediately wire whether you wish to enter the business or not."

I was informed by the Committee in charge our prices were still too high and wired again as follows on the 26th: "The interview with the Municipal Board who inform me our prices are as low as others received, am very anxious to get this business and am prepared to split commission in two halves rather than lose it. Do your very best, and have advised the place where they will close Friday night's meeting."

Mr. Editor, I thought half a loaf better than no bread, hence my reason for offering to split my commission in two halves. I remember we all feel the depression in business just now.

On March 28th I received the following telegram: "Name lowest we can quote on present ocean freight, hope to secure to-morrow lower freight by guaranteeing return cargo to vessel and trust to make reduction fifty cents net ton, wire if this interesting and we will telegraph you definitely Saturday morning." It was on Saturday morning I received above and sent a copy to the Chairman, Hon. J. Harris, and Mr. C. Ayre, the Committee appointed by the Board to deal with the business. I got a further message at 2 p.m. same day as follows: "We now quote \$22.45 net ton delivered St. John's, trust you can secure order, writing."

I at once sent copies of that message to the Committee but to my great surprise at six o'clock I received a note from the Secretary stating the Board had accepted my offer of \$27.50 per net ton on dock St. John's for 5,000 feet six inch pipe, and 2½ tons Pig Lead at 4½c. per pound, and also regarding the large quantity of pipe with me.

This closes my statement with regard to the manner in which your humble servant has been dealt with in the Iron Pipe transaction. Now the question arises did I desire the minor portion of the order? If so my prices were right and it is for the Committee to explain why I did not receive the whole order.

Revives.
