SURGERY.

Surgery is a branch of medicine which started as an offshoot and has wound up as the main stem. It is one of the most beneficent forms of human endeavour, as it usually leaves the patient strong enough to express his gratitude but too weak to protest against the size of the fee.

Fifty years ago surgery was seldom resorted to save in cases where the patient had broken both legs in three places and could not be appeased by the mustard plaster. He was then set upon by three or four of the neighbors and restored to his original contour. Much ingenuity was shown in the treatment of these cases, which left the patient with an unimpaired appetite and a lumpy physique.

Surgery has taken great strides in recent years, chiefly due to the accidental discovery of the appendix, a small, malignant growth which attacks rich and poor in the same spot. Thousands of well-informed citizens who did not know whether the appendix was located on the right side or hung just below the base of the brain have been relieved of its presence as the result of an operation which left no sting until the first of the month following.

One of the greatest achievements of modern surgery is the painless removal of the red-necked tonsil, an operation which involves no discomfort whatever except for the brief period of three weeks, during which the patient is able to take no solid food except vegetable soup. Removal of the tonsils has been the salvation of many an amateur singer whose voice was freed of its fetters to such an extent that he could be heard in the next township with perfect ease on a windy night.

Surgery is performed with the greatest success and nonchalance in hospitals where the patients are catalogued by number and operated on in relieved relays. The hospitals of this country have multiplied so rapidly in recent years that few people find it necessary to make a trip to London or Paris or Berlin in order to part with an adenoid or have a sprung rib regulated. In fact, the best American hospitals have become the world's model for rapid, scientific workmanship at a lower hour cost.

Surgery is sometimes scoffed at by people who are never converted to its merits until they have been thrown through the windshield in trying to jump an open bridge, which causes an immediate and enthusiastic change of front.

Your Boys and Girls.

Baby's milk bottles need not necessarily be boiled, but they should be thoroughly cleaned. If the baby does not take all the milk in the bottles throw away what is left, and immediately scrub the bottle inside and out, using a brush which comes for the purpose, and suds made from pure soap.

Rinse with hot water and then fill with water in which borax or bicarbonate of soda has been dissolved. Stand in a rack until the food is prepared the next morning. Then turn upside down to drain, and rinse thoroughly with clear water to remove the borax. Turn upside down to drain and cool, ready for refilling.

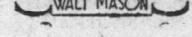

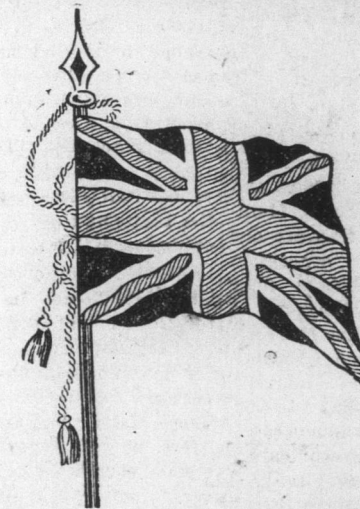
