fax Morning Chronicle says: "There will be a new Franconia, for example, to replace the steamer of that name which was sunk by a torpedo on October 1. 1916, while carrying troops between Malta and Greece. The Alaunia is to recall the vessel torpedoed fifteen days later off a lightship in the English Channel, and the Laconia, her predecessor, sunk on February 25, 1917. The Aurania was struck early in the following January near Londonderry, drifted for two days and nights and, going ashore at Tobermory, Island of Mull, became a total wreck. Seven lives were lost by the explosion of a torpedo which, on January 26, 1918, sank the Andania off the north of Ire-


