## Piling on The Agony.

This Year Estimates to Carry An  
Extra \$1,500,000 -- Salaries of  
Ministers and Members Increased  
--Where is the Money Coming  
From?

(Daily News.)

What's delaying the Estimates?  
This question is worn threadbare in  
the asking. The House of Assembly  
has been in session nearly two months  
and there is yet not a word as to  
when Supply may be expected. The  
general reason given for the delay is  
that the Estimates are not printed,  
but from the stories that are afloat  
as to what they contain, it would ap-  
pear as if the Government are rather  
afraid to bring them down to the  
House, or are deliberately holding  
them back until the bye-election in  
the District of Bay de Verde is pulled  
off. It is convenient of course to throw  
the responsibility on the printer, but  
even if he is to blame, there is abso-  
lutely no reason why the Government  
should not have introduced supply  
and brought down the Estimates for  
the various departments as they were  
ready, without waiting for the whole.  
In view of the lateness of the season  
and the well-known desire of some of  
their supporters to get back home to  
their business, some arrangement of  
this sort may have been made.

But when they do come down, judg-  
ing from information which has  
reached The News during the last  
day or two, they will give the delu-  
d people who expected "reform" a  
jolt that will be staggering. If late  
governments were generous in their  
expenditures, the Squires Govern-  
ment promises to eclipse them all,  
and a great deal of the increased ex-  
penditure will go into their own  
pockets.

Last year the Minister of Finance,  
Sir Michael Cashin, presented Es-  
timates totalling seven millions of dol-  
lars; the estimates of the new Minis-  
ter, Mr. Brownrigg, will total nearly  
eight and three-quarters millions. In  
other words, the burdens of the people  
are being increased over one and a  
half million dollars, and this at a time  
when the outlook for the country is  
not too promising and when economy  
in every branch of the service should  
be practised.

In the new increases the Ministers  
of the Crown are said to be sharing  
liberally. They have placed their sal-  
aries at four thousand dollars each,  
and to make sure they will not under-  
value their services, have increased  
the sessional pay of the members of  
the House of Assembly from two  
hundred dollars a year each to one  
thousand. In other words the minis-  
ters will make at least five thousand  
a year. In the case of Mr. Squires,  
however, the gentleman who was go-  
ing to rescue his bleeding country  
from the hands of "the gruffers," and  
who is drawing two salaries, and it  
is said three, plus perquisites and  
allowances, nothing less than ten thou-

sand a year suffices. He is to receive  
four thousand a year as Prime Minis-  
ter, four thousand as Colonial Secre-  
tary, one thousand as Sessional pay,  
six hundred from the Board of Re-  
view of Separation Allowances, over  
three hundred as Director of the Sav-  
ings Bank, and in addition receives  
hundreds in prequisites from the Col-  
onial Secretary's Department, and is re-  
ported to be drawing the salary of the  
Minister of Militia, which is at least  
three thousand, and possibly other  
amounts at present unknown. His  
income from the Government is at  
least \$10,000, and may be \$15,000.

It is easy to be a patriot at \$10,000  
or \$15,000 a year, with the possibility  
of further additions in big legal fees.  
Isn't it? Is it any wonder that this  
"saviour of his country," this gentle-  
man who was prepared to "devote his  
life and talents to the services of his  
country," is ready to fight to the last  
ditch to retain his position, and is  
prepared to descend to any depths to  
maintain his hold on the public Treas-  
ury.

Incidentally it is also not to be won-  
dered at that Mr. Cave was "persuad-  
ed" to take the Ministry of Shipping,  
and to fight the bye-election in the  
District of Bay de Verde. Five thou-  
sand a year to Mr. Cave is a nice  
"honorarium," much more than the  
"bone and sinew," whose votes he is  
now soliciting, will make this year  
out of the fishery.

In addition, it is understood the  
new Estimates provide that the mem-  
bers of the Legislative Council, that  
branch of the Legislature which the  
redoubtable Mr. Coaker always af-  
firmed he would wipe out as soon as  
he acquired the power, are to have  
their sessional indemnity raised to  
two hundred and fifty dollars each.  
But this is not the point that will in-  
terest the "Noble Lords" the most.  
They will be interested to learn that  
they are to have a real, live, official  
government leader who is to be spe-  
cially paid for his services. In the past  
a representative of the government  
has been found to pilot the Bills  
through the Upper Chamber without  
pay; but now the gentleman who is  
to perform that very onerous duty,—  
and will it be the Hon. Mr. Shea or  
that bosom friend of Mr. Squires,  
the Hon. Mr. Gibbs?—is to receive a  
salary of five hundred dollars in ad-  
dition to the usual "indemnity."

We wish to add that, according to  
reliable information which has reach-  
ed us, the regular pensioners, the Old  
Age Pensioners, and the widows, the  
orphans, the aged and the infirm are  
not to be included in the generous  
"givings out" of this "Liberal" and  
"Reform" government. Liberal indeed  
—liberal to themselves!

## Motor Accident.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Jardine,  
manager of the Nfld. Brewery had a  
narrow escape from injury if not  
death. When coming down Dwyer's  
Hill in his motor he changed gears,  
and in some manner the car shot to  
the side of the road, the front wheel  
striking the guard rails of a bridge  
demolishing them. The driver, how-  
ever, held his seat and stopped the  
machine. The front wheel went over  
the bridge, the rear one being barely  
one foot from the coping. This much  
alone saved the car and occupant from  
being hurled to the river below, a  
height of some 8 feet. Men from Ren-  
nie's Bakery were soon on the scene  
and procuring some barrels and  
planks made a support for jackscrews  
and levers. When the car had been  
levered up, a number of men with  
ropes pulled it to a safe position. The  
car was not very much damaged, one  
head light and dasher being smashed.  
Last night a number of Council men  
repaired the bridge.
