Assembling on Water Street shortly after 10 o'clock, and headed by the Merchant Marine Ensign the delegates and a number of fishermen risited all the wharves, calling on the fishermen to join with them. Hundred's did so and in several instances where fish was being discharged the skippers ordered the hatches put on, and joined with their crews in the parade. After visiting all the wharves, the parade, which was then several hundred strong, proceeded to the Advocate Office. The delegates, headed by Capt Jesse Winsor, went in and had an interview with the Editor, Hon. A. Mews.
