"Suum Cuique."

For once we borrow the above title from our esteemed contemporary which lives, moves and has its being on Duckworth Street, when its contents are not dictated from Port Union. But whilst taking the loan of this copyright phrase we are not at all unmindful of that which it implies, when addressed to the one body of men whose burden the user thereof took upon himself when it suited his purpose and styled his book, "To each man his own" is a motto which could very well be carried out in the complete entirety of the expression, if sincerity of purpose went behind it, but it becomes an empty phrase when individual opinion only stands at the back of it. And the fishermen have caught on to the false sentiment underlying this one time famous quotation. No longer do they base all their hope on the sentiment implied by the original user thereof. Having experienced the woes of undeserved faith in this proclamation, they no longer have confidence in the expressor or in the expression; hence they have branched out for themselves, and will stand by the more modern methods they have adopted. The preliminary meeting on Friday night last was more or less an earnest of sentiment, on the part of those who promoted it, in favor of those who will attend to-night's gathering, at which the number of speakers will express themselves in language of a vigorous type, and will be equally vigorous in voicing the unanimous sentiment of the North, a sentiment which will be followed by something similar from the West. To-day the fishermen are making the great fight of their life: against oppression; against a burden of taxation; against the general condition of affairs as controlled by the powers that be in the maladministration of government. These men have decided in their own minds that a radical change is absolutely necessary. Too long have they been made the stepping stones whereby ambitious, and indigent, politicians have climbed into office, and have drawn fat salaries without having given adequate returns for such stipends, paid by the people, while these latter have had to perambulate the streets with hat in hand in an effort to dispose of the very commodity which pays for the whole concatenation. The "underdog" as the Advocate so earnestly described him, when it suited the policy of that paper, is no longer down on his uppers. He commands the whole situation, and his defence of himself merits the approval of all who depend on the results of his labors. What would the country do without the fishermen, whether Labrador or Shore, if these men did not day in and day out, prosecute the industry which is the main stay of the Colony. Has it then come to this that these men must be insulted and reviled because they seek their inherent rights; because they demand only the right to live on the products of their toil. Not so! the day of their deliverance is dawning. On the horizon of the future appears the glow

which will lighten them to success in their reasonable requests.

Supreme Court.

(Before the Full Bench.)
In the matter of the Will and Estate of Terence Halloran.

Judgment of Mr. Justice Johnson in the appeal against judgment of Mr. Justice Kent is read, dismissing the appeal, costs to be settled in Chambers. Chief Justice Horwood concurs in the judgment.

In re The N.M. Clothing Co., Ltd.
The judgment of Mr. Justice Kent, dismissing the application with costs is read. Mr. Justice Johnson and the Chief Justice concur.

L. Shepherd, Appellant, vs. Michael Traill, Respondent.

This is an appeal from the judgment of Magistrate Power of Bell Island. In the case before the magistrate, Traill was not convicted, although he pleaded guilty to driving a motor car without a license. The appeal is upheld. It is ordered that the case be remitted to the Magistrate with instructions to enter a conviction against the respondent, with costs to the applicant. Both judges concurred. The reason Magistrate Power gave for dismissing the summons is that he considered the Motor Cars Act to be Municipal legislation dealing solely with matters coming within the jurisdiction of the Municipal Council, and that the regulation of motor traffic on Bell Island, being of that nature, the respondent was not guilty of an offence under the Act.

Magistrate's Court.

Four drunks, arrested on Saturday, were released yesterday morning on depositing the usual sum of \$2 each. Five men appeared before the bar on a charge of being drunk and disorderly and fighting on the public street on Wednesday night last. By the evidence submitted a bitter feeling exists between the men, and to avoid any future recurrence they were ordered, on their own bonds, to keep the peace in their own recognizances in the sum of \$50. A young girl of Bristol's Field stood charged with stealing some wearing apparel and the sum of \$10, the property of her step-sister. She was remanded for eight days.

Outport Fires.

HOUSE DESTROYED AT BRIGGS JUNCTION.

Word has been received in town that the dwelling of Section Foreman John Sullivan, Briggs Junction, was destroyed by fire at 8 o'clock last night. No particulars covering the occurrence are to hand. STATION AT MILLERTOWN JUNCTION GOES UP IN FLAMES. The Reid Nfld. Co. received a message this morning to the effect that the railway station at Millertown Junction was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. Very little of the contents had been saved. The fire is presumed to have been caused by a defective stove pipe. The agent, who lives over the station, lost all his possessions.

Schooner Ashore.

TOTAL WRECK AT BAY BULLS. A message was received this morning by the Marine and Fisheries Dept. stating that the schooner Passover, whilst entering Bay Bulls on Saturday night went ashore and became a total wreck. The Passover was built in 1876 at Nogen Harbor, Green Bay for Gilbert Ridout. She is registered at 18 tons.

Schooner Wrecked off Bay Roberts.

CAPT. AND CREW SAFE.

Information has been received in town that the schooner Passover, Capt. James Crawley has been reported a total wreck off Bay Roberts Point. From the message conveyed it is gathered that the vessel was proceeding to Bay Roberts in ballast to lay up there for the winter. The Captain and crew were rescued from their perilous position and taken into the above place.

Fishermen Call on Advocate.

DEMAND RETRACTION OF CERTAIN STATEMENTS MADE BY THAT PAPER.

Some hundreds of men who are members of the United Fishermen's Movement held a demonstration this morning to compel the Advocate management to withdraw certain false statements published recently in that paper with regard to the movement for higher prices and reduced taxation. Assembling on Water Street shortly after 10 o'clock, and headed by the Merchant Marine Ensign, the delegates and a number of fishermen visited all the wharves, calling on the fishermen to join with them. Hundreds did so and in several instances where fish was being discharged the shippers ordered the holden put on, and joined with their crews in the parade. After visiting all the wharves the party, which was then several hundred strong, proceeded to the Advocate Office. The delegates, headed by Capt. Jesse Winsor, went in and had an interview with the Editor, Hon. A. Mews. Their demands were acceded to except that he refused to disclose the name of the sender of the message in question. Whilst the conference was in progress Mr. W. Parsons, photographer, taking advantage of the sunny morning and an unusual gathering made several snapshots of the scene. Following the visit to the Advocate, the parade marched down to Water Street and up to Bowring's Cove. Capt. Jesse Winsor here addressed the men saying that their mission had been satisfactory. The parade then disbanded, after which the delegates met and prepared the following letter which was despatched to the Advocate for publication in to-day's issue:

St. John's, Nov. 13, 1922.

Editor Advocate.

Sir—We waited on you to-day, to demand that you withdraw certain false statements made in the Advocate about the United Fishermen's Movement, and you agreed to publish a letter from us. It is false that Mr. Morine drew up or inspired the resolutions passed in Bonaville Bay, or that he initiated our movement. He has been chosen as our adviser, and is helping us now. It is false that partisan politics animate us, or any sentiment other than the good of our country, and the welfare of our people. It is false that the people who started this movement have broken sunder since, or that the movement is less enthusiastic than at the outset. We welcome support, but we will not submit to misrepresentation, and if you continue as you have begun, we shall adequately punish you.

An Appreciation.

Accepting the invitation of a friend I spent the last week end at Conception Bay, one of the beauty spots of Conception Bay, and while there was taken to the Opera, "The Enchanted Glen" performed by the pupils of the Convent School, and the performance, for children, was so uniformly good that I thought they deserved an appreciation.

There is no doubt of the refining influence of music and of the part it should take in education, and while in town every facility is given to the children, in many places in the outports these are lacking and consequently great credit is due to those teachers, who, in spite of many drawbacks try to implant a love of music in those around them. That this love and appreciation of music co-exists in the people of Conception Harbor with a desire to help the hums was evident from the crowded house that greeted the children. Though late, with true outport courtesy I was given a front seat, but every inch of room was taken up and I was told afterwards that many could not obtain admission.

Taking everything into consideration there was no doubt of the general excellence of the production as a whole. To train children to sing properly, to get the proper attack, the keeping together quality of some more than quantity, is not easy but here it was done with a very marked degree of success. Above all, a spirit of intelligence seemed to direct the older girls. In adopting themselves to the different moods, they seemed to live their parts rather than act them.

Where all is good it is not easy to be personal, but Misses Kery, Keating and Buck, deserve special mention. Miss Buck's voice, though not strong, is very sweet and has a great appeal. Miss Kery is a born comedienne. The Queen's part was admirably taken by Miss Keating. A pleasing feature of the entertainment was the graceful dancing of the little tots. To Miss Lulu O'Toole who, as a comedian, gave the children every assistance, a word of praise is due, but specially to the Sisters who must have spent much time and trouble with their charges.
