Harbor Grace Notes.

METHODIST CHURCH AT HARBOR
GRACE HOLDS UNIQUE SER-
VICE.PHOTOGRAPH OF REV. LAWRENCE
COUGHLIN, FIRST METHODIST
MISSIONARY TO COME TO
NEWFOUNDLAND IS
UNVEILED.

Easter Sunday was set apart as Thanksgiving Day for the Methodist Church at Harbor Grace, and on which a very special event in the history of the Church took place. The day set, however, was changed, and on Sunday evening last, April 8th inst., what we may term a most unique service, was held. The Preachers were:—Rev. Dr. Fenwick, Supt. Missions, St. John's, and Rev. Wm. Harris, pastor of the Church here; and there was a capacity congregation. Miss Gertrude Davis, the regular organist, also Miss Mollie Pugh, presided at the organ and a full choir was in attendance. After hymn—"O for a thousand tongues to sing, my great Redeemer's praise," had been sung, and prayer opened by the Rev. Dr. Fenwick, the anthem "Do Something for Others," was very effectively rendered by the choir. For the lesson the pastor then read the 60th Chapter of Isaiah the last verse of which is very applicable to the zealous missionary, Rev. Lawrence Coughlin, and the foundation which he laid. "A little one shall become a thousand and a small one a strong nation." "I the Lord will hasten it in His time." The large congregation then joined in singing the hymn "See how great a Flame aspires," and immediately after, the Rev. Harris delivered a very fine address, dealing with the "Introduction of Methodism in Newfoundland," and traced the doings of the Rev. Coughlin, who in 1765 was the first Methodist Missionary to come to Nfld., and who made his headquarters at Harbor Grace. Rev. Coughlin remained in Newfoundland seven years, and Hr. Grace has the distinction of being the first on this side of the Atlantic where Methodism was preached. The first Church was erected by Mr. Stretton, a merchant of that time, near Stretton's Hill, and at his own expense. The second was built in 1822, and burned down in 1850; the third, was erected in 1851, and burned down in 1904. The present church was erected in 1904. At the close of the address, the pastor's wife unveiled a photograph of the Rev. Lawrence Coughlin, which had been covered by a beautiful silk flag and placed at the base of the pulpit. This picture is believed to be the only one in existence, and on account of it being the original, it has been sought after by the British Methodist Conference. W. A. Mann, Esq., of St. John's, purchased the photograph from the late James Vey, photographer, had it framed and very kindly passed it over to the Methodist Church at Harbor Grace—the scene of Rev. Coughlin's first efforts. Mrs. Harris expressed much pleasure in being so highly honored and said that this very photograph had hung in the home of her sainted Grandmother (it having in the first place belonged to the Pike family of Carboneau) and regarded it as a very remarkable coincidence, that it should be her privilege to take part in the unique event. After the unveiling, the hymn "Lead on, Oh King Eternal," was heartily sung, next followed the address of the evening, which was delivered by Rev. Dr. Fenwick. In a very able manner the Rev. gentleman dealt with "The Progress of Methodism in Newfoundland," and stated that while the missionary spirit such as dominated the life of Rev. Lawrence Coughlin, shall continue to exist amongst our workers for the "Cause of Methodism," the good work of the church shall still flourish. The address was very lengthy and most inspiring. At the close Miss Doris Newworthy, of Clarke's Beach, very beautifully rendered the solo "My Father Watches Over Me," and after the offering had been taken up all united in singing the Hymn—"There's a light upon the mountains, And the day is at the spring. When our eyes shall see the beauty And the glory of the King," which concluded a service long to be remembered by the Methodist folk of Harbor Grace. It was indeed a red letter day for that church, and Newfoundland Methodism in general.

Six School Girl Bandits Captured.

LITTLE REGINA MAIDS DETAINED
EXPLOITS WITH CONSIDER-
ABLE PRIDE.

REGINA, March 28.—(Can. Press.)—With the capture of six little girls, all under 13 years of age, and the confession of the children concerned, the city police have cleared up a series of mysterious petty thefts which have been taking place since last December.

Six little maids from school, children of Canadian parents, living in the southeast residential district of the city, yesterday told the police, not without a tinge of pride, that they had been making the price of their Christmas presents and picture shows by organized looting of houses. The value of the goods stolen by the children is over \$150, one haul alone being over \$35 cash.

The number of houses entered during the past three months is not known, even to the children themselves. A pretty little child, barely 8 years old, told the police that she had been in so many houses that she could not begin to count them.

Infants Strong Grip.

The popular myth of the infant Hercules strangling two serpents, is declared by scientists to be a not impossible feat. New born infants have a power of grasp which, considering their size in comparison with that of adults, is almost incredible. A baby's arm a few hours after birth is so strong that it can cling to a finger or stick, and hang suspended for at least ten seconds. In one case an exceptionally strong baby remained suspended by his right hand for two minutes and thirty seconds. The strength of arm increases daily for a fortnight, when the maximum power is reached.
