FRANCE WARNS TURKEY.

LAUSANNE, May 3. France has officially warned Turkey that she does not like the Turkish concentration of troops on the frontier and has added that if the military pressure is not removed it may be difficult for France to maintain the Lausanne negotiations with the Turkish representatives. The statement maintaining that a perfect right to "mobilize" where we think fit. The representatives explained that the limit is attached to the notification to Turkey and there is no reason why the Lausanne negotiations should not continue at least for the time being. The general impression in French circles is that the conference would be adjourned. The second day of the conference is now witnessed by a financial and economic crisis between Turkey and Britain on territorial questions. France's protest against the Turkish position is approved by the British delegation.

THE GERMAN PROPOSAL.

BERLIN, May 3. Germany's latest reparations offer is the sum total of the obligations which shall be fixed at thirty gold marks. The Government has made public here to-day, in accordance with its receipt by the League of Nations, the German proposal that twenty billion marks shall be paid in the form of bonds issued at 100 per cent interest on the internal money market, five billions raised before July 1st, 1919, in the same manner, and the remainder similarly before July 1st. The note assures that Germany will also make payments in accordance with existing obligations. The note expresses the government's conviction that the new reparations represent the utmost limit of Germany's capacity to pay, and that it does not exceed her ability. 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Black currant tea is very good for sore throats. Simmer a tablespoonful of black currant jam or jelly with the juice of half a lemon, sugar, in one pint of boiling water for a quarter of an hour.

To clean tiles, whether on hearth, walls, or in bathroom, rub over with turpentine, applied with clean, old fannel.

A pretty bedroom chair can be made by enamelling the woodwork of a deck-chair, covering the canvas with cretonne, and fixing a cushion at the head and another at the knees. To save your shirt from mud-splashes wear a piece of elastic long

enough to fasten over your dress below the waist; draw up the skirt at the back until it is out of danger, and the elastic will hold it in position.

Dates make delicious sandwiches, and are a healthful change from the stereotyped "jelly-piece" for the children. Pigs can be used in the same way to vary the diet.

In washing paint be particular to rub up and down, not crosswise, and in giving the final "dry rub" to polish use a cloth quite free from fluff.

Wash parsley in hot water, not cold, if you wish the parsley to keep its flavour. This method has the further advantage of being less trouble.

After removing books for dusting it is a wise precaution to paint the shelves with turpentine to keep off moths and prevent worms.

To economise in tea open the packet and spread over a sheet of paper, then place in a warm oven for ten minutes. The tea goes further, and the flavour is improved.

A copper kettle that has been blackened by the fire must first be washed well with soap and soda, then scoured with paraffin and knife powder. Two or three cleanings may be necessary.
