ITALY SENDS GREECE AN ULTI-MATTIM.

ATTIONS Ang. 30. The Italian Government has given Greece an ultimatum that an answer nust be forthcoming in twenty-four hours to the Note demanding that Greece pay an indemnity of fifty thousand lire, salute the Italian fleet, and nunish Greeks responsible for the murder of five Italian members of the Greece Albanian Boundary Commission. Preimer Gonatas told the newspapermen all demands were not acceptable, but an answer will be given within the limited time.

MAYFLOWER UNABLE TO COM-PETE IN RACES. GLOUCESTER, Aug. 30.

The Gloucester schooner Mayflower lost another opportunity to show speed in the race when it was found that her huge cargo of fish cannot be unloaded and the schooner prepared in time for the postponed Liptor Prentiss Trophy Competition tomorrow, off Gloucester. In connec tion with the ter-centenary celebration three schooners Elizabeth Howard, Henry Ford and Shamrock are ready for the contest which is set for ter o'clock.

DEATH OF A PRINCESS.

LONDON, Aug. 80. Princess Anastasia, of Greece, died peacefully at eleven-fifty-five this evening without regaining conscious ness. She was formerly Annie May Stewart, daughter of an Ohio banker. She married William B. Leeds, a tin plate king, who died eight years later leaving forty million dellars to his widow and son, William, Junior, who married Princess Xenia, of Russia, niece of Constantine of Greece.

VESSEL BREAKS LOOSE IN CHINE CANAL.

MONTREAL, Aug. 30. On account of the wall of water released by the breaking of the upper gates of Lock No. 1 of Lachine Canal, the steamer John B. Keetchum erashed through the lower gates of the Lock and averted a collision with a passenger liner and other vessels by hurriedly dropping anchor. The lower gates of the Lock were carried away and hurled into the harbor, while the upper gates were left broken and useless. The John B. Keetchum sustained minor injuries.

BODIES OF ALPINE CLIMBERS RECOVERED.

The bodies of Sir Hubert Hayden and two guides who left Lauterbrunnen, on August 10 for an excursion upon Jungfrau, were found yesterday on the west base of the precipice.
