




**News and Gossip
 of the Pro. Boxers
 And Wrestlers**

BUFFALO, April 15.—Dave Shade,
 California middleweight, won a ten-
 round decision from Frank Schoell,
 Buffalo. Jimmy Sherry, Buffalo mid-
 dleweight, knocked out Pat Walsh,
 Cincinnati, in the second round.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Johnny
 Dundee, featherweight champion, will
 open the boxing season at the Polo
 Grounds May 21. His opponent will
 be selected from Kid Kaplan, Carl
 Duane, Sir Terris or Eddie Wagner.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., April 15.—
 Charley Manty, of New Bedford, won
 the judges' decision over Danny Fyatt,
 of New York, in a 10-round bout here
 last night. The bout was fought at
 130 pounds.

PARIS, April 15.—Georges Carpen-
 tier, accompanied by a number of
 sporting partners, left Paris yester-
 day for Vienna where Carpentier
 has an engagement to box Arthur
 Townley, the English light heavy-
 weight, on April 27.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Georges Car-
 pentier would rather battle Tom Gib-
 bons, St. Paul light heavyweight at
 Michigan City, Ind., on May 31, than
 engage in the first fight of his pros-
 pective American campaign against
 Gene Tunney, United States light
 heavyweight champion, in New York
 or New Jersey this week of June 9.

This information, marking the
 latest development in a lively battle
 among rival promoters over Carpen-
 tier's engagements in this country
 was cabled yesterday to Billy Gibson,
 Tunney's manager, by Franco Des-
 camps, the Frenchman's manager,
 who expressed a desire to alter his
 agreement, with Gibson making pos-
 sible the Gibbons-Carpentier match
 first. He suggested July 4 as a date
 for the match with Tunney.

Rejection of this plan, however,
 was immediately announced by Gib-
 son, who declared he would hold Car-
 pentier to the letter of an agreement
 to fight Tunney first and if necessary,
 seek an injunction in Indiana courts
 to stop the Gibbons fight. Gibson's
 contract with Descamps entitles him
 to a prior claim on the French fight-
 er's services here. Floyd Fitzsimons,
 Michigan City promoter, mean-
 while is going ahead with plans for
 the match he proposes to hold May 31
 in spite of Gibson's attitude. Jack
 Curley and Eddie Kane, Gibbons'
 manager, are now on their way to
 France as emissaries of Fitzsimons
 to induce Descamps to go, through
 with their plans.

HARTFORD, Conn., April 15.—
 Jack Taylor, Omaha, negro refused to
 go through with his scheduled fight
 with Harry Wills here April 30, for
 the American Legion. He gave no
 reason for his withdrawal.

Efforts by the matchmakers to
 match Wills with either "Batling"
 McCreary, Clem Johnson, or John
 Lester Johnson, all negro fighters,
 failed, Wills through his manager,
 Paddy Mullins, refusing to fight any
 one of the trio. The State Athletic
 Commission has stepped into the
 breach and will endeavor to force
 Wills to meet a worthy opponent on
 the date selected.

PHILADELPHIA, April 15.—Wil-
 liam Young Stribling, Georgia light-
 heavyweight, last night scored a tech-
 nical knockout against Tex McEwan,
 of Ottawa, in the seventh round of
 their scheduled ten-round bout. Ref-
 erree Lew Halley stopped the fight to
 save McEwan further punishment.
 Stribling gave McEwan a severe
 beating. Taking the offensive at the
 opening going, the Georgian ham-
 mered and pounded his opponent about
 the ring almost at will. McEwan
 fought gamely, but was no match for
 Stribling, and was saved by the bell
 in the fourth and fifth rounds. Mc-
 Ewan weighed 180 pounds and Strib-
 ling 167.
