## Running Twenty Miles a Minute!

An astonishing fact, which would rarely occur to one when watching the leisurely antics of a fly in the air, is that whereas at that particular moment it is probably moving at the rate of five feet a second, in a few brief glances, quicken its pace to thirty-five feet a second.

Experiments have proved that a baby fly, barely visible to the naked eye, can cover six inches in a second. If that fly were a man with a two-foot stride running, it would run at the rate of twenty miles a minute.

The strength of some insects is almost unimaginable. A common beetle was covered by having a quart-bottle of milk placed over him, so that he should be kept captive without being hurt. To the captor's amazement the bottle began moving and gliding along the table. The beetle was pushing 112 times its own weight.

Had the beetle been a boy buried inadvertently under the giant bell of St. Paul's, he could have marched along the streets, pushing his prison in front of him.

Even a small ground beetle, the subject of experiments by a well known entomologist, was able to climb an inclination of five degrees, dragging after it (attached to its leg by a silk thread) a weight equal to 125 grains.

## A Meal of Moths

Moths hardly appeal to the average man as an article of diet. Yet there abounds in certain parts of Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand a moth which, at one time, was highly esteemed as an article of diet by the aborigines of those countries.

This is the Bugong moth, to which scientists have given the name of *Agrotis spina*. It is a dull, brownish, stout-bodied insect, measuring from one and a quarter to two inches across the wings. There is nothing especially attractive about its appearance.

Years ago a well known naturalist recorded that these moths congregated in myriads in the isolated granite rocks in a particular district which he visited during November, December and January.

What was the object of these assemblages it would be difficult to say. The natives, however, turned the occasion to their own advantage, and came from far and near to collect the moths. After removing the wings they ate the bodies, or powdered and smoked them to preserve them for future use.

The bodies of the Bugong moths abound in an oil, and have a nut-like flavor. When first eaten they cause violent sickness. After a few days, however, this wears off, and the native who chooses this peculiar diet begins to get fat.

Black crows were other eager consumers of the moths. However, the natives dealt with these marauders in summary manner, dispatching them with their clubs and using them as food.



Only two or three men sell them; they are quite well known, but they cannot be apprehended—the mere possession of false weights not being an offence. Their users, however, can, of course, be prosecuted.
