NEW YORK GIANTS
EAGERLY WAITING
FOR TODAY'S GAMEWhite Sox Confident Now
of Winning Series and
All Games Perhaps

New York, Oct. 8.—Notwithstanding the reverses sustained by the New York Giants in their two encounters with the Chicago White Sox, followers of the national game in Greater New York are eagerly awaiting the third contest, which will be played on the Polo Grounds tomorrow.

Still hopeful that McGraw's men have the punch that will bring the world's baseball championship to this city after 12 years of effort, many thousands of devoted fans will pack the spacious stands to root for the home club.

The teams arrived in New York tonight. The Giants were greeted by hundreds of friends as they dropped out of their special train in Harlem. Those who expected to see a dejected lot of subscribers were met by a group of cheerful as though it were the Sox who had suffered the bitterest defeat of the season. East Yorkers as though tomorrow's game will tell a different story.

Victory was written all over the faces of the Chicago players. A large crowd to be expected on hand to see Roland's men, and they were given a cheer as they left their train. It was a happy lot of athletes, brimful of confidence that the victory was theirs. To the victorious American leaguers, it is not a question of winning the series, but whether they can do it in four straight.

Weather conditions for tomorrow's game promise to be all that is desired. A light rain fell early tonight, but the weather man soon said the fears of fans when he announced that the day would be fair and cooler. The playing field is expected to be in excellent condition.

Big Crowd Expected

A crowd that will tax the capacity of the Polo Grounds is expected to be on hand to see the White Sox and the New York Giants. The entire underground of 9,000 reserved seats has been sold in advance, and the distribution of the tickets will be a task for the club. The direct supervision of Harry Womack, president of the club, worked all through Sunday and late today in sending out the tickets. Hundreds of telegrams and letters remained unanswered. The club offices were crowded most of the day with fans of the Sox, who had tickets, but there was none to be had.

Tonight some of the reserved seats began to appear at ticket agencies and among speculators, but the number was not large as was expected. The New York club took every precaution, based on past experience, to get the much-sought-after tickets into the hands of patrons and not the speculators.

Nevertheless, some choice seats in the upper stand were offered at \$35 for a set of three and \$70 for the entire set. Hundreds of telegrams and letters remained unanswered. The club offices were crowded most of the day with fans of the Sox, who had tickets, but there was none to be had.

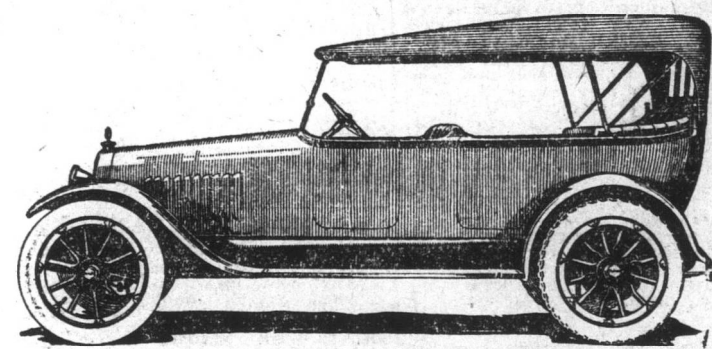
