The Canadian Government on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture and the Canadian Food Board, at the request of the British Ministry of Food for increased ship ments has commandeered all the creamery butter made between September 30th and November 9th, inclusive, in the Provinces of Alberta Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec for export to Great Britain and Allies.
