**THE WEATHER PROPHECY.**  
Toronto, Feb. 17, 11 p.m.—The depression which was over Illinois last night has moved very quickly eastward today in moving quickly, with increasing force across the lake region, followed by a developing area of high pressure now over the Missouri Valley. Light snow and rain have fallen in the lake region and Nova Scotia. Elsewhere the weather has been fair. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 10° below—12° above; Hamilton, 10° below—12° above; Qu'Appelle, 22° below—20° above; Winnipeg, 20° below—4° above; Toronto, 25°—30°; Montreal, 10°—33°; Quebec, 12°—24°; Halifax, 25°—35°.

Local temperature, yesterday—Highest, 35° above zero; lowest, 31° above zero.

**TOMORROW, Feb. 17, 11 a.m.—**The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Winds, mostly strong from west and northwest; clearing, colder weather.

**LONDON AND ENVIRONS.**

—Station Foreman Aiken, of Central Fire Hall, has resumed duty.

—The Preston Club will give their second assembly on Friday evening in the City Hall.

—A gang of corporation men have been given work scraping the plentiful mud off Richmond street.

—Two new cases of scarlet fever have been reported from Bathurst street, near Richmond street.

—The Forest City Cycling Club have secured the celebrated humorist, Mr. J. W. Bengough for a lecture in Victoria Hall, Feb. 20.

—Miss Renand, of Brooklyn, who has been visiting her sister, Mrs. Passmore, in this city, left last evening for Pittsfield, Pennsylvania.

—The friends in this city of Dr. J. S. Ryerson, of Toronto, will be interested in hearing that he has returned from his trip to the West Indies.

—Miss Sara Lewis is home on a short visit from Buffalo, where she is meeting with exceptional success in her adopted profession in a leading hospital.

—Eternal advertising is the price of trade. Some argue that it is expensive to advertise. It is the most profitable expense you can have, if you handle it properly.

—The recent rain has brought a large quantity of snow down the river. A big jam has formed at the Cove bridge, causing the river to rise to within three feet of the top of the breakwater.

—Dan, Curtin, a Toronto man, was arrested Monday, charged with stealing 1,000 cigars in the Queen City. He will be kept in durance vile here until an officer arrives to take him back.

—Ed. Fountain managed to saw enough wood last week to pay half his statute labor tax, and was given another seven days by the police magistrate this morning to make up the remainder.

—Fred Scott, charged with obtaining money under false pretences in illegally collecting accounts belonging to Thos. Passmore, an East End printer, was arraigned at the bar of justice yesterday. The affair amounted to very little, as the prisoner's mother had paid a portion of the money due at Christmas. Scott was discharged on promising to settle the balance.

—Col. Sergt. A. M. O'Brien, of "P" Company, Seventh Battalion, appeared in the Police Court yesterday at the instance of Lieut. Coe. The former had neglected to return his military clothes, as the statute provides, within one week of his discharge, and only complied when he received a lawyer's letter three or four weeks afterward. The case was accordingly withdrawn, the defendant to pay costs. Officers of the Seventh desire all to bear this regulation in mind.

**Accident to the Globe Train.**  
The Globe train came to grief early yesterday morning while passing the bridge over the railway cut, and the locomotive collapsed, but fortunately a stoppage was effected before any serious damage was done, although the driver, Mr. John McDermott, of this city, sustained a painful scalp wound, which had to be stitched by a Paris doctor, the subject bearing the operation with the greatest pluck. The engine is considerably smashed.

**The Dairyman's New Project.**  
The Board of Directors of the Dairyman's Association of Western Ontario, at their meeting held in the Tecumseh House, this city, passed a resolution to appoint farm inspectors if sufficient encouragement is given by the factories. A committee was appointed to wait upon the Ontario Government and solicit an increased grant to enable the Board to carry out this project.

A resolution was also passed expressing regret and sympathy with the family of the late president, J. B. Lane, a copy of which the secretary was instructed to have engrossed and forwarded to the family of the deceased. An executive committee was appointed for the year.

**CONCERNING THE OLD FLAG.**  
The British flag is loved because it is the symbol of freedom. In Canada it is sought to use the British flag to persuade the people to remain in a state of commercial slavery, of bondage to rings, trusts and combines.

The British flag is honored because it is a reminder of the achievements of British pluck. It is sought in this country to make it the peculiar badge of a party which declares that Canadian manufacturers cannot compete with American manufacturers in a fair field with no favor.

The British flag is revered as the symbol of fair play and justice. The men who are prating about it here are the authors and defenders of the gerrymander of 1882, of the Franchise Act of 1885, of the dissolution which deprives over 100,000 young men of the right to vote.

The British flag is respected as the symbol of honor. It is used here to cover boozing, theft of the public resources, theft of the public money, dishonesty in public contractors and testimonials by public contractors to ministers, the sale of a great railway charter for a bribery fund.

The late London Artemis Ward used to deliver a lecture called "Sixty Minutes in Africa." He talked for an hour or more without making any allusion whatever to Africa, and wound up with the following peroration: "Now, my beloved hearers, I am about through.
