## In Parliament.

## Outrageous Conduct of Government Officials in Last Election.

H. C. Cameron and the English Lord Chief Justice.

Banquet to Lord Russell—Proposal to Abolish the House Bar.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—The opening proceedings of the House yesterday included the introduction of the Minister of Railways and Canals (Mr. Blair) and the Controller of Customs (Mr. Patterson). The Ministerial side gave them a rousing ovation. Mr. Patterson was introduced by Mr. Laurier and Mr. Blair. The ex-Premier of New Brunswick was brought in by Mr. Davies and Col. Domville. This makes the new Cabinet complete, with the exception of the Minister of the Interior.

Dr. Landier asked about the ballot stuffing in North Ontario, and Major McMillan having been given the seat on the recount before Judge Burnham. He wanted to know what the Government intended to do about it. Mr. Laurier replied that when the legal proceedings in connection with the protest which had been entered against the election had been disposed of, the Government would consider the proper course to be taken both as to the seat and the punishment of the offenders.

ABUSE OF POWER.

A most flagrant abuse of power on the part of the late Government was disclosed to the House by Mr. Fraser today. He moved for copies of all instructions given on the I. C. R. by the authorities to remove the employees shortly before the day of election to prevent them voting in the counties in which they resided, the names of the authorities giving such instructions and the authority therefore.

There was no end of testimony to the scandalous misuse of the Government's power in connection with the railway election. Mr. Fraser told the House that in Picton, the constituency represented by Sir Herbert Tupper and Mr. Bell, books of railway passes were in the hands of boys for distribution to anybody and everybody. In Antigonish and Guysborough the same tactics were pursued. Men who desired to vote for Mr. Fraser were not allowed to leave their work upon the railway to do so. A more shameful misuse of a Government railway was never seen in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Haggart said that he had given no orders of the kind described. But Mr. Fraser said that he had given Mr. Choquette gave further examples of misconduct of Government railway officials at the general election.

THE MOTION WAS ADOPTED.

NORTHWEST CREAMERIES.

Mr. Davin presented, not for the first time, a motion affirming the expediency of devoting \$20,000 to aid in the establishment of creameries and cheese factories in the Northwest Territories, the sum to be considered as an addition to the immigration grant.

Mr. Oliver, Alberta, while expressing his readiness to aid in the promotion of a plan likely to forward western interests, pointed out several objections to Mr. Davin's scheme. The difficulty of maintaining creameries in sparsely populated country and the absence of herds of cattle were mentioned. Mr. Oliver also referred to the inadvisability of the Government entering into competition with private enterprise.

Mr. Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, asked Mr. Davin to withdraw the motion and to ask the Government to take the matter into serious consideration and try to make such provision in the ordinary way as might accomplish the purpose in view.

Mr. Charles Tupper agreed with this view.

Mr. Davin then attacked Mr. Oliver for opposing his views, and was answered by Mr. Fisher.

Mr. Davin had no right to traduce Mr. Oliver. Mr. Davin was sitting his last session in the House. He was only elected by the casting vote of the returning officer, and would be unelected and rejected in a new election.

CIVIL SERVICE RETURNS.

Mr. Haggart moved for a variety of returns regarding dismissals, removals and superannuations of civil servants since July 11.

Mr. Laurier amended the motion so that the information dated back to the 23rd of June.

The following motion of Mr. Toimie was adopted: "A return of all complaints made against Mr. Rae, Minister of the Interior, and Mr. Bruce, and of correspondence relating to such complaints, and of any action of the Government thereon."

Mr. C. M. Cameron said that this man's service should be dispensed with immediately if the complaints should be found to be well-founded. The complaints were that he had let the lights go out and was one day beastly drunk.

The House adjourned at 6 o'clock. Mr. Foster gave the Government notice that to-morrow (Thursday) the Opposition would discuss the issue of Governor-General's warrants.

BANQUET TO LORD RUSSELL.

It was a notable gathering which assembled in Rideau Club last night to do honor to England's Lord Chief Justice. The dinner was given by the Premier and the members of the Government. About 90 were present, embracing private counselors, judges and members of both Houses and of the legal profession. The Premier presided. On his right was Lord Russell, the guest of the evening, and on his left Sir Frank Lockhart. Other guests seated at the table of honor were Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Oliver Mowat, Mr. Fox, Mr. Crackenthorpe, Speaker Pelletier, the Senate, Chief Justice Sir Henry Strong, Hon. L. H. Davies and Hon. R. W. Scott.

NOTES.

The Liberal members of Parliament from Nova Scotia are circulating a round-robin favoring the abolition of the bar in the House.

Mr. Henry will ask if the Government purposes establishing a free

postal delivery in Brantford, or in cities of over 14,000 inhabitants.

Mr. McCleary will ask if the Government or any member thereof issued a circular letter to the manufacturers of Canada asking for information in reference to the tariff.

Senator Boulton took occasion last night to correct the statement of Senator Loughheed that he was a Liberal because a free trader. He said that he was a Conservative, and that his former friends had drifted away from British principles.

Hon. Mr. Blair says there will be no railway subsidies this year. Chief Justice of England Lord Russell had a seat on the floor of the House yesterday. He was on the floor of the House of Commons on the inquiry of the Languevin block. He afterwards asked to be introduced to the member for West Huron, and remarked: "That was a terrible arraignment." "I only wish," replied Mr. Cameron, "that I could have tried it before your lordship."
