The Stock Yard.

—Swine on dairy farms are too frequently treated much as wild animals are in museum, confined in pen-and-cages and fed food given what the hand of man and not nature is pleased to provide. Hogs should graze in the fields as much as cows or horses, as they are essentially grazing animals. Ontario farmers have not as much acre land lying around loose as their brothers on the Northwestern prairies, but they have plenty for the purpose indicated.

—When lambs are weaned there are two essentially important points—to take the

ewes from the lambs, and not the lambs from the ewes, and to place the latter out of hearing of the former. The stronger and higher conditioned the lambs who weaned, the greater the necessity for treating them well afterwards. A field of ripening pasture should be reserved for them where they can be placed in a day or two when their grief has been overcome, and the pangs of hunger compel them to settle down to feeding. While they need at this period an abundance of "keep," they do not require it over rich, and nothing is more calculated to cause a heavy mortality than to assign them an exclusive run of grass.

which has been heavily stocked for some time previously with sheep; a clean pasture is very essential. It is often customary to place them on the clover aftermath, but this has to be done with care, for they eat greedily of quickly-grown grasses, food of this description, diarrhoea may be set in, and possibly hoove may be experienced; and when the former disease appears amongst lambs it is very difficult to eradicate. Instead, then, of giving the full run of a pasture of this nature, it is wiser to give them a few hours bite in it during the day, gradually increasing the same until they get ac-

comes to it, when they can entirely leave the old pasture on which they have been partially kept. Perhaps the most important of all is to keep the lambs away from the cover when it is wet with dew or rain, until they are thoroughly broken in to use. A little cake and corn renders them less liable to disease at this period of their life, and to keep them improving a frequent change of pasture is necessary during the remainder of the summer, and a not very heavy stocking of the land important, while a supply of running water is a beneficial when it can be obtained.
