A MATCH FOR BIG MONEY.

It weighs but four pounds and two ounces. It is charged with a gravity battery, and will cost but 50 cents a year for material.

Pieces of dories and oil punctured were also seen floating about, which told that the unfortunate schooner had met her end.

The E. B. Phillips was an American vessel about 30 years old, and it is reported she was in an unfit state for bank fishing. The schooner was not surveyed in the spring, and was in a leaky condition during her second trip. She was spoken by Capt. "Willful Murder."

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury on the Phair Tragedy.

Important Testimony Given at Last Night's Adjourned Meeting.

Witnesses of George and Duncan Toles, Eye-Witnesses of the Affair—A Graphic Description of the Shooting—The Post-Mortem Examination—The Jury Deliberate for Twenty Minutes.

The spectators at the Police Court stood several rows deep behind the barrier that separated them from the court proper last night when the adjourned inquest on the Phair tragedy was resumed. At 7:30 o'clock Coroner Flock and all the nineteen jury-men were on hand, and the prisoners, who had been taken from the jail and were waiting in the cells below, were sent for. They were brought in, handcuffed together by P. C. Nickle and Egerton and placed in the dock, the onlookers craning their necks to get a glimpse of the two now notorious men. Wilson and Burke sat side by side. They listened attentively to the evidence, but whatever their feelings were they exhibited no outward sign of concern. They said little to each other, but at certain points of the evidence they would exchange a syllable or two and a smile. The crown was represented by Mr. J. B. McKillop and the prisoners by their counsel, Mr. P. McPhillips. The first witness was

GEORGE TOLES.

George Toles, sworn—I am a farm laborer, working near Courtright, in Moore township. I was in London on Thursday, Oct. 13, with my brother Duncan. We were going up Richmond street, toward the C. T. R. station; we went into a tailor shop; I came out first and noticed a boy carrying a coat, and with him the prisoner Burke. They were going north. Burke seemed to be throwing his arms out. The detective stepped out of a shop, walked up to Burke and tapped him on the shoulder. Then he pulled Burke's hands behind his back, half-way round; then the detective clinched Burke by putting his arms around him, tripped him and threw him down. My brother and I walked up to Burke and said, "You would strike me, would you?" Then he called on me to help him. He said twice to me, "Help me to hold this man," and the third time he said it to me. Queen's name. At the third time I went without hesitation and knelt on Burke's thighs. Next I saw the prisoner Wilson (witness identifies him), who stood a few moments, and then

STARTED TO PULL HIS REVOLVER

from the right side. He unrolled one of some thing into his left hand, then changed it to his right, held it up and told us to throw up our hands. Phair said, "I won't do it," and reached out and grabbed the revolver, turning the muzzle upwards. I stepped back and saw Wilson shove Phair pretty well down. Phair at the time was partly kneeling on Burke and had hold of the revolver, I think. Burke started to get up and said,

"YOU'VE GOT YOUR GUN; USE IT."

Wilson's revolver was then hanging partly down. When Burke said this to him Wilson lifted the revolver, pointed at Phair and fired. They both started to run, and when Burke was between ten and twelve feet away from Phair he shot at Detective Phair as far as I could see. Wilson was never shot. Wilson's feet were Phair's feet. Wilson was about nine feet from Phair when he shot. After Wilson fired Phair got on his feet, held his hands to his left side and said: "Lord have mercy on me, I'm shot." I asked him if he was badly hurt. He said: "I guess it's done me."

After the firing I started after the prisoners and didn't see Phair again.

To Foreman McCormick—I saw the boy run past immediately after the shooting.

THE WITNESS IDENTIFIES WILSON.

Cross-examined by Mr. McPhillips. This is the second time I have seen the prisoner since the shooting. The first time I saw him was in the station the day after the shooting. My brother and a police officer were with me. The police asked me to point out the one who did the shooting and I did so.

McPhillips—Can you point out the one who fired the shot now?

The prisoners stood up and the witness pointed at Wilson. The witness continuing said he saw no revolver on Phair's person.

Q.—Do you know whether that shot fired by Wilson struck Phair? A.—Well, I have every reason to believe it did.

Q.—How many shots were fired afterwards? A.—I don't know. I heard the distinct shots before they crossed the streets. No, I don't know who fired them.

DUNCAN TOLES.

Duncan Toles—Am a brother of previous witness. The first thing that attracted my attention when we stepped out of the tailor shop was a boy carrying a coat and the prisoner Burke, who was throwing his

arms around. I next saw Phair step out of the butcher shop and go up to the man and try to put the handcuffs on. Then he tripped him up. We started back and Phair called on my brother three times to help him hold down the man. My brother then knelt on Burke. I saw Wilson come running up from the south to the spot. He stopped for an instant or two and then started to pull out a revolver from his right side. He unrolled it out of something into his left hand and then changed it to his right. He said something and Phair said "I won't do it." Wilson shoved Phair back and then Burke started to get on his feet. Burke said to Wilson, "You've got your gun; use it." Then Wilson took aim at Phair and shot him. The prisoner started to run, and when 10 or 12 feet away Burke fired at Phair. Phair said, I think, "My God, I am shot!"

THE POST-MORTEM EXAMINATION.

Dr. Waugh, sworn, said he had made the post-mortem examination in conjunction with Dr. Williams. Witness handed in the written result of that examination. It stated that the bullet had entered opposite the sixth rib, splintered the eighth rib, grazed the lower lobe of the left lung, penetrated the diaphragm, passed through the left kidney and finally lodged in the spinous process in the deep muscles of the back. Any one of these injuries would be sufficient to cause the death of the victim. Mr. McPhillips—What was the weight and caliber of the bullet?

Dr. Waugh—I do not know; I have had little to do with firearms.

Dr. Brown, sworn, said he was present when the post-mortem examination was made. He agreed with Dr. Waugh's statement. The bullet had penetrated the left kidney and one of the smaller intestines. These wounds collectively no man could escape. Any one of them were dangerous, but the one in the intestine was, he thought, the direct cause of death, as it produced intense inflammation.

Dr. Williams also corroborated Dr. Waugh's statement.

THE VERDICT.

Coroner Flock said that they had now sufficient evidence before them to serve their purposes. He thought it better that the prisoners should be taken out while the jury deliberated. Burke and Wilson were thereupon taken below and the court room was cleared of everybody except the coroner and the jury. In twenty minutes the following verdict was brought in:

"That Thomas Wilson and John Burke did feloniously, wilfully and of their malice aforethought kill and murder the said Henry Phair at the city of London, in the said county, on the 13th day of October, 1892."

This was signed by all the jurymen as follows: A. McCormick (foreman), Wm. Tackaberry, Fred C. Hammond, Thomas Gillespie, Joseph Goldner, John Macdonald, John M. Denton, James Dunn, George E. Burns, John McMartin, John H. Chapman, Robert Lewis, David Smith, Hewitt Fysh, John Gentleman, Wm. Hiscott, Archibald Sharp, Samuel Turner, John Burridge.

Wilson and Burke were told the nature of the verdict and received the news calmly. They were then taken to their cells in the jail, there to await trial at the next court of competent jurisdiction, which will be the assizes, which open in either April or May.

MR. BARTRAM ELECTED

To the Clerkship of London West, Made Vacant by Mr. Minton's Removal—A Good Appointment.

At a special meeting of the London West Council last evening the resignation of Mr. T. S. Minton, as village clerk, was accepted and the appointment of a successor made. There were five candidates for the position: Messrs. W. H. Bartram, C. W. Greenway, Donnelly, Donaldson, W. L. Hastings, all of London West. On the fifth ballot, Mr. Bartram was elected by a vote of 3 to 2 over Mr. Platt, who is a son of the reeve.

The bylaw confirming the appointment was thereupon read and passed, so that Mr. Bartram may enter upon the duties at once, as Mr. Minton leaves with his family Thursday for his new home in Toronto. Mr. Minton has been clerk of London West for fourteen years and a resident for twenty years. His official record has been an excellent one, and by his removal the village loses a faithful servant and an estimable citizen. The council made the best possible choice in offering the clerkship to Mr. Bartram. That gentleman's municipal experience, business ability and thorough knowledge of the corporation's affairs exceptionally qualify him for the post.

The council did some Court of Revision work, five or six appeals being laid over. All the members were present, namely Reeve Platt, Deputy-Reeve Scarrow, and Councilors Spence, Collins and Chapman.

A Wholesale Arrest.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 25.—Nearly 200 Mexicans who composed the so-called revolutionists army of Gen. Carranza Garza are now under arrest awaiting trial here for violation of the neutrality laws. The latest capture is that of Pablo Salas, one of the leaders of the movement.
