SHOOTING SUSPECTS

High-Handed Proceedings of Gen. Rios at Iloilo.

Story of Pando's Flight Denied—Good-Bye to Cervera.

Manila, Sept. 4.—According to advices from Iloilo, Gen. Rios, governor of the Visayas, is arresting and shooting suspected persons, including prominent natives of Manila. The obstructions on the railway from Manila to Calocan have been removed, and the first train left yesterday. It is expected that traffic will be resumed to the other terminals tomorrow.

New York, Sept. 4.—The story from Havana that General S. De Pando, the former commander of the Spanish forces at Manzanillo, had secretly fled Cuba to the French steamship Notre Dame de Saül for Spain with 12,000,000 francs, was proven to be unfounded today when the Ward liner Philadelphia came up to her dock on the East river front. General De Pando was the first of some 400 passengers to land.

Annapolis, Md., Sept. 4.—It is understood here that Admiral Cervera and the other Spanish prisoners will leave here Thursday morning. Capt. Eulate has secured the City of Rome, of the American line, as a transport.

FIVE DROWNED.

Three Boys Swung Out Into the Lake—Foolhardy Rowers Lose Their Lives.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 4.—Frank and John Mauc, aged respectively 16 and 17 years, and George Grass, 14 years old, were drowned while bathing in Lake Erie this afternoon. A heavy sea was on, and a receding wave carried the boys into deep water, where their sank before help could reach them.

Lewiston, N. Y., Sept. 4.—M. B. Marvin, of Buffalo, and Constable Mackenzie of Lewiston, were drowned in the Niagara river opposite here this afternoon. The men were in a small rowboat, and they ventured up the river until they encountered the boiling water of the rapids, where their boat quickly overturned.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

The crops in the Lake St. John Valley, Que., this year, are something phenomenal.

Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, former United States ambassador to Great Britain, is seriously ill.

The report that Gen. Don Carlos Buell is dying at Rockport, Ky., is in poor health, but recovery is expected.

Miss Winnie Davis, the daughter of the late Confederate President Jefferson Davis, is ill with gastritis. Her condition is considered critical.

Capt. Cartwright, R.E., son of Rev. C. E. Cartwright, sailed from England on Friday for this country. He comes to marry Miss Kate Stevenson, of Toronto.

The Canadian Pacific has made application to have the differential rate which the Lehigh Valley Railway enjoys from Toronto to New York, amounting to \$1.25, abrogated.

The United States war department will establish recruiting stations at all places where volunteers are to be mustered out, so as to give those who wish it a chance to re-enlist. The shipping army is below the maximum provided by the war bill.

A GIPSY'S WEDDING

Bridegroom Accidentally Shot Dead Just After the Ceremony.

Bucharest, Sept. 4.—A tragic affair is reported to have occurred at a gypsy wedding at Vladina in Moldavia. The marriage was being celebrated in grand style, with all the traditional usages of the "Tigani."

As is the custom, while the feasting is going on, the bridegroom suddenly rushes to the tent where his future wife is encamped, and seizes her, she screaming, in union with her female companions, for succor. The bride is then carried off, the relations following, and the wedding is a mock chase.

All this took place until the bridegroom started to drive off with his newly-wedded prize. Then, as the first shots were fired, he was seen to throw up his hands and fall from his cart. Someone by mistake had fired a bullet, and this had pierced the unfortunate bridegroom's brain.

The Capture Of Omdurman

Mahdism's Capital Falls Into the Hands of the British.

The Anglo-Egyptian Loss

About 200,

While Many Thousands of Dervishes Were Killed or Wounded.

Charge After Charge of the Enemy Gallantly Repulsed.

Their Masses of Warriors Melt Away Before the Deadly Torrent of Lead.

THE WHOLE DERVISH FORCE TURNED OUT.

London, Sept. 3.—The war office, late in the day, received a dispatch from Gen. Sir Herbert Kitchener, by way of Nasri. It was not dated, and reads as follows: Owing to the wet weather the lines have been broken and telegraphic communication has been interrupted. Am sending this to Nasri to be forwarded. The march has been very favorable. Practically no one has fallen out of the ranks or been invalided. During the two days we have driven in the dervish outposts, after slight resistance. From Jobel Royan we marched to Wady el Obeld, and thence to Surarut. This morning we reached Omdurman, a mile and a half south of Kerri, six miles from Omdurman. The mounted camel corps, with a horse battery, pushed forward to Koshamba, whereupon the entire dervish force issued from Omdurman and were clearly visible. I estimated the force at 25,000 men. They advanced at 11 a.m.

The sirdar's dispatch was apparently sent after receiving Kitchener's report and the telegram breaks off at an important point. Further news is awaited here with interest.

REPORTED CAPTURE OF KHARTOUM.

London, Sept. 3.—A report which lacks confirmation is current here this afternoon that the Anglo-Egyptian forces have captured Khartoum. It is said that the loss of the Anglo-Egyptian army is 2,000 men, while that of the dervishes is placed at 8,000.

Up to a late hour this evening no confirmation of the report of the capture of Khartoum had been received at the foreign office or the war office.

—THE FALL OF OMDURMAN.

Omdurman, opposite Khartoum, on the Nile, Nubia, Sept. 2, by camel post to Nasri.—The sirdar, General Sir Herbert Kitchener, with the khalfah's black standard, captured during the battle, entered Omdurman, the capital of Mahdism, at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the head of the Anglo-Egyptian column, after completely routing the dervishes and dealing

A DEATH BLOW TO MAHDISM.

Roughly, our losses were 200, while thousands of the dervishes were killed or wounded. Last night the Anglo-Egyptian army encamped at Agaziz, eight miles from Omdurman. The dervishes were three miles distant. At dawn today our cavalry, patrolling toward Omdurman, discovered the enemy advancing to the attack in battle array, chanting war songs. Their front consisted of infantry and cavalry, stretched out for three or four miles. Countless banners fluttered over their masses, and the copper and brass drums resounded through the ranks of the savage warriors, who advanced unwaveringly, with all their old-time order. At 2:30 a. m. the enemy crowded the ridges above the camp and advanced steadily in enveloping formation. At 7:40 our artillery opened fire, which was answered by the dervish riflemen. Their attack developed on our left, and in accordance with their traditional tactics, they

SWEPT DOWN THE HILLSIDE

But the withering fire maintained for 15 minutes by all of our line frustrated the attempt, and the dervishes, balked, swept toward our center, upon which they concentrated a fierce attack. A large force of horsemen, trying to face a continuous hail of bullets from the Cameron Highlanders, the Lincolnshire regiment and the Sudanese, was literally swept away, leading to the withdrawal of the entire body, whose dead strewn the field.

THE BRAVERY OF THE DERVISHES

can hardly be overrated. Those who carried the flags struggled to within a few hundred yards of our fighting line, while the mounted emirs absolutely threw their lives away in bold charges. When the dervishes withdrew behind the ridge in front of their camp the whole force marched in battalions toward Omdurman. As our troops surmounted the crest adjoining the Nile, the Sudanese, on our right, came into contact with the enemy,

Tolu, Tar and Tamarack.

Mahdi, Tuti Island, and the palm trees of Khartoum.

Drawn up in five divisions, with a wing thrown back, was the khalfah's army, its spears and swords glistening in the sunshine, arrayed northwest of the town in the desert. The tents of the camp were on the north side of the town. In the central divisions were an enormous number of banners, including one of blue and one of black. A number of mounted dervishes galloped forward, and our dismounted troopers fired upon them, hitting several and driving off the remainder. Three squadrons of our cavalry pushed to

who then advanced at our lancers, and the Egyptians retiring. The gunboats are now (Thursday afternoon) bombarding the forts at Omdurman and Khartoum.

PRATISE FROM A FRENCH SOURCE

Paris, Sept. 4.—The Temps, eulogizing General Sir Herbert Kitchener, says: "A march so scientifically planned may be likened to the solution of a mathematical equation."

VICTORY COMPLETE.

London, Sept. 4.—The war office has received the following dispatch from General Kitchener, dated Saturday evening: "The remainder of the khalfah force has surrendered; and I have now a very large number of prisoners of my hands. Our cavalry and gunboats are still pursuing the khalfah and his chiefs, who, with only about 140 fighting men, are apparently making for Kordofan."

SUNDAY EVENING.

"The camp has been moved outside Omdurman to the river banks. Our wounded are doing well, and are now descending the river. The Austrian sister, Theresa Origoini, and all the European prisoners have been rescued. They are well."

"The list of our casualties has not yet been received. The population of Omdurman manifests joy at the arrival of the expedition."

GERMANY'S TORPEDO FLOTILLA DAMAGED.

Berlin, Sept. 3.—The recent northwest storm which swept across the Baltic sank a German torpedo boat and severely damaged the whole German torpedo flotilla. Five of the torpedo boats barely reached harbor.

BURIAL OF THE SUICIDE.

Paris, Sept. 4.—The services at the internment of the remains of Lieut. Col. Henry at Pogy yesterday were civil, the Bishop of Chalons having forbidden religious services. Several staff officers were present at the ceremony.

SUGAR GROWERS WANT RELIEF.

Bridgetown, Barbadoes, Sept. 4.—A congress of representatives of agricultural and commercial societies of the British West Indies met here yesterday on the initiative of Trinidad, to take steps to induce the British Government to afford the West Indian sugar growers adequate relief against the system of European bounty-fed sugars in the English market. Strong resolutions were adopted.

SPANISH PEACE COMMISSIONERS.

Madrid, Sept. 4.—It is currently reported that the Spanish ministers have definitely selected the three following peace commissioners: Rafael Cerero y Saenz, general of engineers; Senor Eugenio Montero Rios and Senor Villaurrutia, under secretary of state for foreign affairs.
