Mr. Southworth has been familiarizing himself, as quickly as possible, with the characterists of the leading areas open for settlement, with the object of being able to speak from personal knowledge as to the local particulars upon which a settler would be desirous of obtaining full information, such as the characteristics of the leading areas travel, vicinity of markets, etc. He is at present examining agricultural land in West Nipissing. There is a large amount of land supposed to be well adapted for settlement that has not as yet been inspected, but the work is being steadily proceeded with. It is an obvious advantage to the intending settler to be able to obtain such information at a central point before starting to look for land, as it saves his visiting localities not adapted to his requirements.

In the Thunder Bay district last year Mr. R. A. Burriss, formerly of Bowmanville, did much to aid settlers by furnishing them with information and helping them to select land. #### **NEAR-BY "BOXERS"**

An Organization Said to Exist in New York City-U. S. Soldiers Sent to Japan.

New York, July 11.-An intelligent Chinaman, who is very much Americanized, said today that there were Boxers in this city, that they were organized and active, and that Chinatown, which has so often been described as calm and altogether indifferent to the news from China, was under the surface in a state of intense excitement, says the Commercial Advertiser. The informant goes on to assert that the so-called Boxers have established lodges or secret conclaves, to which they are inviting all the Chinese of the quarters. They are not requiring active participation in the most secret work of the organization, but they do demand money, and they get it. This money, they say, is to be sent home to help the anti-foreign movement in China.

Washington, July 11 .- The state department has made public the identical note which was recently delivered to the powers as defining the position of the United States respecting the Chinese troubles. It embodies the views to which this government has strictly adhered from the beginning of the present troubles, and which the different powers have now taken into favorable consideration. The United States do not consider themselves at war with the Chinese nation, but that all their efforts should be directed to localizing the disturbances in the province of Chi Li, and keeping them from spreading throughout the empire, by enlisting on the side of peace the powerful viceroys of Central and
