**ARRANGING THE
FINAL DETAILS**

Everything Ready for the Old
Boys' Coming.

Let Everybody Decorate Stores,
Houses and Other Buildings to
Welcome the Visitors.

A meeting of the executive com-
mittee of the Old Boys' Association
was held last night, at which the final
details of the approaching celebration
were arranged for. Those present

those not wise enough to order in ad-
vance.

The committee are confident that

has been fine today in all portions
of Canada. The highest temperatures re-
corded were in Manitoba and Cape
Breton, being 82 and 84 respectively.

tures: Kamloops, 54-82; Qu'Appelle, 42-
66; Winnipeg, 58-80; Port Arthur, 46-80;
Perry Sound, 54-72; Toronto, 53-78; Ot-
tawa, 54-70; Montreal, 51-66; Quebec,
58-66; Halifax, 64-74.

Local temperatures, Thursday: High-
est 74, lowest 53.5.
Today (Friday) the sun rose at 5:07
a.m. and sets at 7:40 p.m. The moon
rises at 8:37 p.m. and sets at 7:42 p.m.

AUGUST WEATHER PROBS.

It is evident from the predictions of
the Rev. Ira Hicks, a well-known
meteorologist, that we are to have a
spell of weather in August. Venus
and Vulcan are the operating deities,
who are to control certain periods,
the blacksmith having the best of the
argument. Perturbation on the part
of Venus, a disgracefully full moon,
and disturbances at the equator all
occurring today, promise us threaten-
ing stormy weather, as August comes
in. A very warm wave is due about
the 6th to the 9th, with thunderstorm
finish, hail and high winds. Then a
decided fall in temperatures should
come, Vulcan retreating for a few days.
The cool wave will not be prolonged,
however, for it is anticipated that
about the time of the new moon, or
the 14th, there will again be very high
temperatures, with electrical distur-
bances, and bustling storms. The
moon is due to move south of the
equator on the 16th, and another Vul-
can period ensues, though there is
promised a very brief respite. From
Sunday, the 18th, to Tuesday, the
20th, increased temperature is looked
for, with falling barometer and
storms. On the whole Mr. Hicks
looks for a very dry August, excepting
for these storms, which will affect
some localities with startling dis-
turbances of rain and hail. A great deal
of lightning is promised, with a gradual
cooling off as the September equi-
nox begins to form for the fall. Se-
vere summer storms are looked for
on the 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th, affect-
ing various parts of the interior and
the lake and coast regions, followed
by cooler weather, with occasional
brief changes to warmer. September
is not to be as warm as in other
years, and the equinoctial storms will
come much earlier.

magazines 485. The average daily cir-
culation of books and magazines was
200 and 20 respectively. The receipts for
the period amounted to \$32.47, consist-
ing of fines \$19.80, sale of cards \$3.15,
sale of catalogues 80 cents, lost books
50 cents, damaged books 95 cents, and
incidentals \$3.67, making the average
fines per day 75 cents. In July 63 cards
were issued, making the total issue to
date 8,722. A donation by Mr. G. W.
Armstrong of ten volumes of "Mes-
sages of the Presidents" was acknowl-
