Ship to Cost \$80,000.



Bernier's application for aid for a polar expedition. There were in the deputation, Messrs. John Charlton, Leblanc, MacPherson, Smith, Angers, Archambeault, Rose (Marquette), Demers (Levis), Turgeon, Champagne, Carbonneau William Ross (Cape Breton), Wright, Lavoigne and Senator Porier. The Government was asked to provide a steamer to cost \$80,000, with which the captain would be content. Mr. Prefontaine asked if Capt. Bernier on his return would be willing to hand back the ship, to be hereafter used as a Government boat. The captain was willing. The Minister professed to be favorably disposed, but explained that
