A Rather Stormy Meeting Held by West Londoners

Ratepayers Gathered to Discuss the Flood Matters.

Confine Compliments Almost Entirely to City Engineer.

Pass a Resolution Demanding Protection From Flood-Committee Named to Wait on Council.

West Londoners last night aired a select coterie of grievances at a largely-attended meeting in Collins' Hall, winding up by passing a resolution calling upon the city of London, and the Provincial Legislature to erect a breakwater high enough and strong enough to protect the village from the flood when the river accumulates periodically its "jag," and goes on a tear to the last. The meeting also considered suggestions regarding the widening of the Cove bridge over the Grand Trunk and the erection of a breakwater at the Cove bridge.

DOWNIE LOST ONE EYE

Laborer Asking a Jury for Five Thousand Dollars Damages.

Plaintiff in Sheppard vs. Zavitz Gets Verdict for \$250.

The jury in the case of Sheppard vs. Edward and Ellwood Zavitz returned a verdict at the spring assizes yesterday afternoon, of \$250, for the plaintiff. The action was for damages for injuries received in an assault which occurred near Stratford.

The case of Christopher Downie, who is suing Edward Martyn for \$5,000, was begun yesterday also. In this case the plaintiff alleges that he was employed by the defendant, a contractor, as a laborer, at the construction of the new annex to the Robinson-Little block, and that on the 28th of November last he was wheeling brick into the building. Someone called to him from above, and he looked up and saw a brick falling from the top of the building, and when he looked up he was struck in the face with some mortar. The mortar penetrated the eye, and he had to be taken to the hospital, where, after some weeks an operation was performed and the eye removed. The plaintiff claims that the defendant did not have sufficient flooring in the structure, and that he is, therefore, responsible for the accident.

WOODS' FAIR

IN GREAT DANGER.

Mr. Thomas Jeffery said that the village was in great danger. Just what the water would do some day when it broke in at the north end, nobody could say. The water had come in there once, and it would come in again.

"Who are we to appeal to for our rights?" he asked.

"King Edward the Seventh," drawled a man on a back bench.

Mr. Jeffery said that had it not been for the efforts of the residents the water would have broken through the breakwater in the north end in the recent flood. Today the breakwater was a wreck, and unsafe, and the lives of the villagers were in danger. The dam alongside the village had been badly damaged, and it was a good thing it was. There should be no dams on the river, and the residents should do was go about the matter in a business-like way, and then if the city would not do what was right, make them do it. WORSE OFF NOW.

Mr. Dennis Collins said that despite all the assertions to the contrary before the flood, the breakwater had been left in a bad condition by the city, and he had so reported to the city engineer. Ex-Mayor Little had promised that the people that a permanent breakwater would be built, but this had not been done. He felt the villagers city was not doing what was right, making them do it. THE RESOLUTION.

After Water Commissioner Pockock, Mr. Ald. Gerry then took the platform. He began immediately putting in a good word for the city engineer, Mr. Graydon might have his faults, he said, but he was a good man. People should not be so ready to condemn an honorable city official. Mr. Gerry said many of the suggestions, particularly that relating to the Cove bridge, were good. He said the engineer had already asked the Government for aid to build a breakwater, and he was sure the Government would stand ready to pay 50 per cent of the cost. He favored the issuing of debentures for \$200,000 to put the breakwater in proper repair, but this could not be done without placing the matter before the people of London, and any such demand of the Government, he said, would be snuffed under. Ald. Gerry said that he believed as a whole the city had spent more money on the breakwater than it was bound to spend under the agreement of amalgamation.

AID, WYATT SPEAKS.

Ald. Wyatt said that what West London wanted was a good breakwater. He had five cottages on Wyatt street and he would willingly pay \$500 to have a breakwater built. Last year the city had spent over \$500 on the breakwater, and it had been well spent.

A voice—Only \$500? You ought to be ashamed of yourself.

The assessment of West London was about \$400,000, and on this sum the villagers paid three mills on the dollar for breakwater purposes, of about \$1,200 each year. He quoted figures to show that if this sum had not been spent one year, it would have been lighted small boys mingled with coarser voices in the trade ends.

"We want men with brains to go before the council," said one person.

The committee is as follows: R. A. Jones, W. T. Hamilton, Mr. Bell, Thomas Jeffery, Dennis Collins, F. A. Jones, William Spence, Fred Hazelgrove and John Pearce.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30.
