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HOCKEY LEAGUE MERRY ENGLAND MAY BE EXTENDED SEVERAL NEW CLUBS ARE ASK- ING ADMISSION TO THE INTERNATIONAL.

Several New Clubs Are Ask-
ing Admission to the
International.

Calumet, Mich., June 24. — Secretary

James R. Dee has called the annual

meeting of the International

Hockey League to be held at the

Auditorium Annex, in Chicago, on

June 26. The meeting will be devoted

principally to business left over from

last season's work, and it is expected

that a meeting will be held in Chi-
cago at a later date, when plans for

the coming season will be prepared.

The International Hockey League

was organized in Chicago about a year

ago, and last winter, its first season,

was a prosperous one. Calumet win-
ning the championship. It is almost

certain that all the old clubs will be re-
presented the coming season, i. e., Calu-
met, Houghton, Pittsburgh, Sault Ste.

Marie, Mich., and Sault Ste. Marie,
Ont. Many applications for member-
ship have been received from other

cities, but it is uncertain as yet just
what new clubs will be admitted. It

is possible that the league will be in-
creased to include eight and nine

teams, and in that event, it is likely that
Chicago, Duluth, St. Paul and Phila-
delphia will have to go.

If at all possible, the circuit will
be made compact, and a team in
Chicago would serve to break the long

trip from the coast to the interior.

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Seagram Sprinter Lowers
Kenilworth Record a Fifth
of a Second.

Buffalo, June 24.—Another track record

went by the board at Kenilworth Park

yesterday afternoon, when Merry Eng-
land, the Seagram sprinter, streaked out

six furlongs in 1:12½, lowering Carl Kie-
ler's mark of 1:08 by one-fifth of a sec-
ond. Merry England found a sort of spot

in the third race, getting in with 102
pounds on his back, a fact which evi-
dently frightened Scarfell, the other Cana-
dian crack, and kept several others in

their barns. Odds-on was the best bet-
ting to lose in the betting ring, and the re-
sult warranted the caution exercised by

the buyers. Merry England did not get
away from the post any too well, but J.
Walsh had in the meantime laid a party in
a jiffy, and he retained a lead of a couple
of lengths to the end. Lochivar coming

from the back to second place in the
stretch, but not troubling the winner.

When the barrier was sprung, J. Walsh,
on only one of the best horses in the
country, started out to fight for the lead, as
