

FEAR INTERRUPTIONS

Engineers Say Possibilities of Delay Impairs Value of Niagara Power. Detroit, June 23.—Because of the great risk of interruption in the service, the large power and electric light dispensing companies of Detroit are not greatly impressed with the possibilities of bringing electric power to this city from Niagara Falls. Representatives of various firms in this business in the city have expressed their views on the subject.

"The Edison Illuminating Company has nothing to do with the project for bringing Niagara power to Detroit," said Alexander Dow, president of the Edison Company, yesterday. "In view of the fact that it is no harder to cross the Detroit River with cables than to cross the Niagara River, and that the Edison Company, the D. U. R., the Murphy Power Company, the public lighting commission and other panies which dispense electric light and power are constantly on the lookout for cheaper sources of electricity, it seems that these companies have been overlooking a good thing, or else there is something wrong with the plan to bring Niagara power to De-

A representative of another concern gave instance of the ease with which the service might be interrupted. "Limbs of trees, birds, and other minor causes are enough to cause delays and intermissions in the service and you cannot expect to run power over 200 miles without these troubles," he said.


